younger. Without the proper time in which to train I cannot hope to compete successfully against those who do. In the last twenty-five yards of my race with Johnny Weissmuller in 1924 my legs felt like a couple of dead weights. I'm resigning in favor of the younger fellows. I'm 38, you know, and no spring chicken."

Kahanamoku has been one of the world's most spectacular swimmers over a long period of years. Coming to the States in 1912 from Hawaii, where he was born, he has been a riot ever since. He won the 100 meters at the Olympic Games in 1912, and repeated at Antwerp in 1920. He was second to Weissmuller at Paris in 1924, and during his long career set innumerable swimming records.

His contract with Goldwyn calls for him to play a featured role in a Joseph Conrad sea story, "The Rescue."
