TO MEET WEISSMULLER

Tomorrow "Buster" will face another genuine test when he meets Johnny Weissmuller of the Illinois Athletic club, one man swimming record trust, in the 400 meters event. Many persons here believe that Crabbe has an excellent chance of defeating Weissmuller tomorrow.

Tonight "Dad" Center told the United Press that he is exceedingly proud of the performance of his protege. Center believes that Crabbe already is one of the greatest swimmers of all time.

Swimming experts here predict that at the Olympic games at Amsterdam this summer, Crabbe, with the same condition which gave him his startling victory today, will become Olympic champion.

Weissmuller too established a new world's record when he won the 100 meters freestyle event. His time was 57 4-5 seconds as against his own previous record of 58 seconds flat made at the Waikiki War Memorial pool in Honolulu last year.

George Kojac, champion backstroke swimmer of the New York Boys' club, gave Weissmuller a terrible run for his money in the 100 meters event. Kojac led until within ten feet of the finish when Weissmuller sprinted to win the race by a margin of just about one foot. It was in this race that Johnny Woodd placed third and he received much favorable comment for his showing against such firmly entrenched stars as Kojac and Weissmuller.

The 200 meters breaststroke event for women was won by Helen Zabriski. Helve Vaula was second and Edna Konowaloff was third. Miss Zabriski's time for the race was three minutes, 35 4-5 seconds.
