

CRABBE SCORES MOST POINTS IN NATIONAL SWIMMING CARNIVAL

the Honoluluans to break into the limelight in Saturday's races. Crabbe won the 300 meter medley national championship, the second national title won by him during the meet.

Walter Spence, who nosed Crabbe out to win this event at the 1927 championships, did not defend his title. Crabbe won the race easily, covering the distance in four minutes and 16 seconds, just one and two fifths seconds behind Spence's world's record.

Crabbe finish 10 yards ahead of George Kojac, sensational swimmer from the Boys' club, New York. The Honolulu lad took the lead on the first lap, which calls for 100 meters breaststroke, and kept it during the next lap, the backstroke swim. Kojac gained some on Crabbe during the backstroke lap. On the last 100 meter lap, which called for freestyle swimming, Crabbe sped down his lane at a terrific pace, more than holding his own with Kojac.

The race established Crabbe is a great all-around swimmer as well as America's leading distance star.

Garratti Wins

In the 100 meter freestyle swim, which served as Olympic trials for the Pacific A. A., Eleanor Garratti of San Rafael, California, holder of the world's 50-yard freestyle record, finished first in one minute 12 2-5 seconds. Lily Bowmer May of Honolulu, who won the 400 meter swim the opening day of the meet, took second place.

The Honolulu girl led the first 50 meters but Miss Garratti forged ahead at the half way mark and retained the lead to the finish line. The race was one of the most sensational of the meet as Mrs. May made a strong bid for first honors.

The other feature of the meet Saturday was the 800 meter club relay race, won by the Illinois Athletic club in nine minutes 32 3-5 seconds. This is a new world's record, one and two fifths seconds faster than the record established by the Illinois A. C. team at the national championships in Honolulu last year. The winning relay team was composed of Diphmar, O'Connor, Samson and Weissmuller.
