

BUSTER CRABBE TO BATTLE BORG, IN BIG SWIM EVENT

Honolulu Boy In Fine Condition as He Works Out In Practice—Big Meet Will Open Officially on Saturday—U. S. Team Object of Great Interest

AMSTERDAM, Holland, July 22.—Clarence "Buster" Crabbe of the Outrigger Canoe club, Honolulu, on whom the United States pins its hopes for defeat of Arne Borg of Sweden in the forthcoming Olympic games, demonstrated that he is in splendid condition when he worked out here today.

Crabbe, with George Kojac of the New York Boys' club and Johnny Weismuller of the Illinois Athletic club, showed that the ocean voyage from New York aboard the steamship President Roosevelt hurt their conditions not a bit. All the American swimmers were fast in their workouts today. The relay swimming team will be chosen on Tuesday after the Americans have had two more days in which to work out.

Members of the United States track team had their first real workout this afternoon. Jole Ray, acting spokesman for the American track team, said he likes the track. He predicts that the American runners will carry off many honors during the 1928 Olympiad. His is confident he will capture the 10,000 meters event.

The Olympiad will open officially on Saturday with formal ceremonies. The only actual competition on the Saturday program covers the trials for the weight-lifting events. The program will continue until August 5.

The German and Argentine Olympic teams arrived today, adding to the throng already here representing the many countries which will vie for athletic laurels. Arrangements made so far for the Olympiad have been pronounced more than satisfactory by the arriving contestants. The Americans are happy in their quarters aboard the President Roosevelt which is anchored in the harbor.

Great interest in the Americans, who are 268 strong, is apparent and there is much speculation as to what extent they will threaten the athletic stars of other nations.
