

# ELECT OUTRIGGER CLUB DIRECTORS FOR NEXT YEAR

## Dad Center Is Reelected; Reports Show Successful Year For the Club

Four members of the board of directors of the Outrigger Canoe club elected at the annual meeting of the club last Saturday are George ("Dad") Center, who was reelected; Chester Livingston, Roy Vitousek and Walter Haglund.

The other five members of the board whose terms continue are Samuel M. Starratt, Lorrin P. Thurston, W. S. Raymond, A. F. Bauman and Edward S. Smith.

Officers for the ensuing year are elected by the new board of directors, which is scheduled to hold its first meeting August 9.

Retiring members of the board were J. R. Farrington, who has served as president more than four years; Walter Beall and Louis F. Stephens.

In the president's report Farrington urged that plans be set in motion to acquire the property now held by the club under a lease, which expires in 1937. He expressed belief that another decade will bring developments enabling Honolulu to support a half-million dollar athletic club where the Outrigger club now stands.

### Satisfactory Growth

Although the senior membership is not quite as large this year as it was last year, Thurston, in the secretary's report, said the club had recovered rapidly from the increase in dues last year and had made a very satisfactory growth during the year. The junior membership was larger than ever before, he pointed out, while the associate membership was considerably smaller than a year ago.

In the report of the house and grounds committee, W. S. Raymond, chairman, pointed out the large number of improvements made during the past year, while A. F. Bauman, chairman of the order and entertainment committee, reported that the club had submitted plans to the harbor board for the proper policing of the beach for the protection of bathers against surfriders near shore and against rowdyism.

In the absence of Edward S. Smith, treasurer, who is on the coast, Henry Asch, auditor of the club, reported that the club's income was larger last year than ever before, but a slight deficit was incurred. It was pointed out by several directors that this was necessitated by several important improvements and that during the coming year the club should be able to retire some of its outstanding indebtedness and set some money aside.

George Cherry, manager of the club, was praised by Farrington and Raymond in their reports for his work during the past year.
