Crabbe and Charlton fought throughout the heat—30 laps in a 50 meters tank. Not until the last lay did Crabbe become a favorite to win the heat. There was but a slight difference between them as Buster and Charlton were coming home. With 25 meters to go Crabbe took a

lead of one meter, but the result was uncertain until the touch. Martha Norelius of the United States won an easy victory in the first heat of the semi-finals of the 400 meters freestyle swimming race for women. Miss Vandergoes of South Africa was second. Miss Nore-lius' time was five minutes. 58 sec-
