## Buster Crabbe Finishes Fourth Behind Borg and Charlton

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Aug. 9.— Three of the world's fastest and best known swimmers today were defeated by Alberto Zorrilla, swimming champion of the Argentine, in the

finals of the 400 meters freestyle competition at the Olympic games

Alberto defeated Arne Borg of Sweden, Boy Charlton of Australia, Clarence "Buster" Crabbe of the Outrigger Canoe club, Honolulu;

Austin Clapp of the Hollywood Athletic club and Ray Ruddy of the New York Athletic club.

Zorrilla's time was 5 minutes, 1

3-5 seconds—a new Olympic record. Crabbe, who had been given an outside chance to win, led the American contestants in the race but bowed to the Argentinian, the Australian and the Swede. He finished fourth.

## FINALS TO KOJAC

George Kojac of the New York Boys' club won the finals of the 100 meters backstroke event. His time was 1 minute, 8 1-5 seconds which is

a new Olympic record.

The United States won the first heat of the 800 meters relay race. In the trials for this event the United States established a new Olympic record of 9 minutes, 38 4-5 seconds. Japan was second in the 800 meters relay competition. The Japanese swimmers also bettered the old Olympic mark, making 9 minutes, 42 3-5 seconds in the competition against the United States.

AMERICAN GIRLS WIN

The first heat of the 400 meters freestyle swimming race for women was won by the American girls who established a new Olympic record of 4 minutes, 55 3-5 seconds. In this race Holland was second, South Africa was third and Denmark was
