

Complete Details Of The Regatta Races

The complete running story of the Regatta, race by race and stroke for stroke, recorded during the annual rowing championships yesterday by Es Crane, appears in the following:

FIRST RACE, OUTBOARD MOTOR BOATS

Little Louis Abrams, driving a speedy Eynruder racer, shot into the lead in the opening race for outboard motor boats and held it throughout the event. Abrams, despite his tender years, piloted his boat like a veteran and outkissed his opponents. Foreman Reed, who placed second and J. Donovan Flint, whose motor died during the race. Abrams' time was 9:15 for the two laps and at the finish he was so far ahead that nothing could have stopped him.

Abrams chalked up a victory in this event last year and successfully defended his title again yesterday.

FRESHMAN RACE

Kausal shot over the line with a flying start in the Freshman race with Navy following. Healand and Myrtle were hard by, but Hilo was slow in responding following the gun. They were all even as they lengthened out for the grind to the flags. Kausal and Navy were rowing a fast stroke, about 34 to the minute, with Myrtle and Hilo pulling a 32. Healand was rowing the slowest stroke of the five.

Hilo sprinted in a one-length lead as the barges swept past the lighthouse. Myrtle was second with Healand a half length behind. Navy and Kausal were fighting it out for fourth place and were seen to be creeping up on the leaders as they sprinted for the turning flag.

They turned in the same order, but the distance between first and last barge was less, decreased by a full boat length and it was anybody's race as they shot into the straightaway.

HILO GAINS

Hilo had increased the lead as they swung up the stretch with Navy occupying second place and Myrtle third. Kausal came up to challenge Myrtle and passed Healand. Navy sprinted and caught the tending Myrtle barge, but Hilo held tenaciously to the lead. All four boats started the final spurt together and there was little to choose between them.

Hilo shot into the final two lengths

with a good boat length lead but the Spark Plug was flying over the water with a perfectly timed Navy sprint. Hilo's bow was within ten feet of the line when suddenly Sparky's bow shot across inches ahead of the Big Island crew.

The sprint for third was equally as dramatic. Kausal kept plugging and passed Myrtle within the last ten feet and took third.

Navy's victory was a thriller and brought the stands to their feet, for, until the very end, it looked like a certain Hilo victory. Hilo had led all the way, but Navy had the reserve and crashed through in the final dash. Navy's time was 9:55 4-5.

GIRLS' FRESHMAN

Honolulu got away to a flying start as their barge coasted up to the start with all oars ready. Police was caught and lost a half length at the gun. Honolulu saw their advantage and continued to sprint after the others had lengthened out.

They were all even, however, at the first quarter mark. They swept up to the flag together, but Honolulu rounded first and straightened out with a good length's lead. Police were still in second place with Kunalu close behind. They maintained the same order as they came back past the lighthouse.

Honolulu was still leading into the final quarter mile, but Kunalu had crept up and passed Police. Kunalu challenged Honolulu and the two boats swept the sprint followed by Police. The Cop girls held on the Kunalu and both pulled up on Honolulu. Honolulu shot across the line a length and a half ahead of Kunalu with Police more than three lengths behind in thirteenth. Time of Honolulu, 7:25 1-5.

NOVICE RACE

Police shot away a half length in the lead followed by Myrtle No. 1, with the second Reds a quarter length behind their mates. Myrtle second took second place away from the first Reds challenge the Cop girls for the lead at the lighthouse. Police, however, held their slender lead. Myrtle seconds caught the Cops at the lighthouse turn and appeared to have an even terms with the first Reds slightly back.

Myrtle Seconds hit the turning flag first, but the Cops got around and squared away in the lead again. Red

First was about two lengths back.

Myrtle seconds lifted the bow of the Turbot and caught up a half length before the Cops opened up. The police responded with a splendid spurt and flashed across two lengths a winner, with the Myrtle Seconds and Firsts finishing in that order. The Seconds were four lengths ahead of their club mates. Time, 6:19 3-5. It was the first Polo victory in the history of Regatta day.

GIRLS' JUNIOR

Harry Murray got the crews away poorly, shooting the gun when Kunalu was fully a length behind. Kausal and Honolulu got away to a fast start, but after the boats had traveled 100 yards, Murray shot his gun again, calling them back due to a "false" start. It was obviously an unfair start, and Murray went good judgment in admitting his error and pulling the gun back before they had passed the 100 yards mark.

The second time Murray got them away perfectly with Kausal jumping into a slight lead before coming out of the racing start. Honolulu picked up the stroke and took the lead after passing the quarter-mile mark, with Kausal and Kunalu even about a half length in the rear.

KAULI LEADS

Kausal rounded the turning flag first, followed by Honolulu a length back. Kunalu was still another length to the rear as the boats shot up to the turning flag. Kausal sprinted away, trying to hold the lead established at the turn, but Honolulu hung on. Kausal appeared to be having trouble holding its course and the Yellow and White barges was seen to shift its course several times on the way out.

Honolulu picked up on the way home and crept up to within a length as they passed the quarter-mile mark. Kausal started the sprint first with Honolulu holding on. Kunalu was out of it. The Purple barge held its own in the final desperate sprint and hit the line across the line fully three lengths ahead of Honolulu. Kunalu blew up in an attempt to catch the leaders and coasted in. Time of Kausal, 7:29 4-5. Kausal was fresh at the finish in comparison to the appearance of the other two teams.

KIDS' RACE

Hilo and Healand shot into a length

lead at the crack of the gun. Myrtle seemed to be unable to get away and loomed out before the crews were able to straighten out. Hilo jumped into a slight lead with Healand holding her own. Myrtle continued to sprint to catch up the water lost at the start but the leaders were out in front and remained there to the lighthouse.

Hilo turned a length ahead of Healand with Myrtle two more back. The Blue barge swept around better than Hilo appeared to be almost, on even terms as they straightened out. Hilo gained a length before going into the final sprint and Healand opened up in a vain attempt to catch the Ehuaki II. Myrtle was far back on the outside course. Hilo swept majestically to the finish line gaining an even stroke. It was a beautifully timed sprint. Hilo won by two and a half-lengths from Healand with Myrtle a dozen lengths back. Time, 6:12 flat. (New record, breaking Hilo's old mark of 6:15).

GIRLS' SENIOR

Honolulu shot away one full length in the lead and lengthened this three before they came out of their starts. Honolulu struck up a fast stroke and held it with Kunalu slowing down to about 26 to the minute. Honolulu led by two and one-half lengths at the lighthouse and hit the turn fully four lengths in the lead. The Red crew seemed to have difficulty rounding the flag but was well in the lead at the lighthouse coming home.

Honolulu floated home without apparent effort while Kausal struggled far in the rear. The Honolulu girls showed first class condition and perfect timing. They sprinted only for the last 200 yards and even then it was not their best. They won handily by more than a dozen boat lengths. Time 7:16 3-5.

SENIOR EVENT

The five boats got away even and held to a dead sprint until they swept past the judge stand on the way out. Just before they crossed the line, Bill Blaisdell, Healand stroke, lifted the count and Healand went into a half-swing and Kausal responded and took second away from Myrtle. Police were fourth with Hilo last. Hilo opened up and swung into third place before reaching the lighthouse, Myrtle dropping back.

Honi was still leading at the lighthouse but Hilo had swung into second position with Myrtle third.

Kausal and Police were fighting it out, not far back. Healand hit the turning flag first followed by Hilo and Kausal. Myrtle had fallen back. Healand sprinted away from the flag and had a good lead. The Blues seemed to be fresh as they took up the home ward sprint. Myrtle sprinted into third place, close behind Hilo and the three leaders opened up far ahead of the usual spot.

BLUES STILL LEAD

Healand still had a boat length lead at the lighthouse with Hilo and Kausal hanging on. Myrtle had fallen back with the Police. They straightened out for the final sprint with the Blues two lengths ahead and gaining at every stroke. Hilo sprint followed by Myrtle, the Reds replacing Kausal in third position. Police were far back out of the race.

Healand still had two lengths with 200 yards to go and the Blue boat continued to gain under Blaisdell's superb stroking. Hilo fell back rapidly at the finish and Kausal started picking up again. Healand won by three lengths with Hilo second and Kausal a good third. Myrtle finished fourth with Police last. As the Blue barge dashed across the line, Mel Nicoll, head Blue coach took Healand and swung out to meet his crew. It was an act reminiscent of the "good old days" when rowing was king of them all. Time of the winner 11:15 2-3. It was reported that Hilo had broken the running gear and rowed virtually the entire race without adequate steering apparatus.

CANOE RACE

Outrigger won the canoe race in a close finish from Hul Naik. The other crews were captured near the finish line furnishing amusement for the crowd.

JUNIOR RACE

Four boats got away together with Hilo slightly in the lead. Healand took up the usual snappy Blue stroke and appeared content to allow Hilo to set the stroke. Myrtle was third out with Police holding a close fourth. Hilo turned at the lighthouse first followed by Healand and Myrtle. Hilo's half-swing gained a two length lead at the first turn.

Myrtle sprinted as they pointed out to the flag and took the lead with Hilo and Healand hard by. Myrtle rounded the turn first with Healand and Hilo swinging around in that order. They all straightened out together and started home with the

Reds leading by a length.

UP JUMP POLICE After trailing the entire way out, Police sprinted desperately and wrested the lead from the tiring Myrtles. Healand, too, swept into a sprint and carried into second place, Myrtle being third. The Cops rounded first and started home in a dead sprint. Myrtle and Healand waited to sprint two lengths later. Hilo too sprinted and came up abreast of
