Outrigger Club

More closely associated with Waikiki beach life perhaps than any other single institution is the Outrigger Canoe club, organized 20 years ago principally for the purpose of preserving the ancient art of surf riding and outrigger canoeing, but also for the encouragement of swimming and sea sports of every kind.

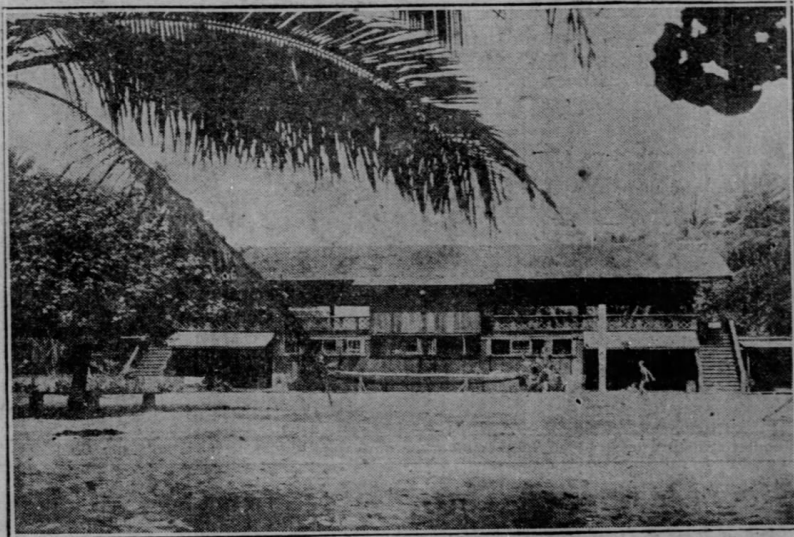
The club has expanded with the years, starting from a mere handful of organizers to its present status of nearly a thousand members and its numerous swimming and athletic facilities at the beach. The clubhouse and grounds located at a convenient point between the Royal Hawaiian and Moana hotels, contains large dressing room accommodations for both men and women, an office, commissary, kitchen tables beneath the hau tree arbor while teas and luncheon parties may be held, an outdoor gymnasium, volley ball court, canoe sheds with their outriggers, some 200 surf boards, an open air pavilion and numerous other advantages.

There are now 600 senior members, 250 associate members and 120 junior members of the club, according to Manager G. E. Cherry.

These swimmers who have brought fame to the islands in national and international swimming contests, have been products almost entirely of the Outrigger Canoe club.

The Outrigger club is the only institution in the islands that has a

fleet of outrigger canoes with qualified steersmen to handle them.
