

RECORD ENTRY LIST IS ANNOUNCED FOR SURF BOARD RACES

Old Marks May Fall In Annual Canal Splash—Complete Entry List and Officials Are Announced for the First Time

ALL is in readiness for the Fifth Annual Surf Board Hawaiian Championships, which will be held on New Year's morning, January 1st, 1929, on the Waikiki Canal. The paddlers have finished up their training, and await eagerly the starting gun of "Pop" Ffaender.

A record entry list in each event has been received, and it is almost a certainty that some of the good records will fall. Beatrice Newport, present quarter-mile woman champion, plans to start the new year right, by not only defending her title, but by aiming to reduce her former time of 3 minutes 49-15 seconds, made in the 1926 races.

P. Spohler and the Newport brothers will be heard from in the boys under 18, quarter-mile race.

HUI NALU STAR

In the 100-yard men's open event, champion T. Kiakona, paddling under the Hui Nalu colors will endeavor to maintain his place as Hawaii's fastest 100-yard paddler, and to lower his own record of 40 1-5 seconds for the event, which he made last year.

A new event, put on by request is the 100-yard for men over 30; "Robt" Askew, J. Hollinger and Bill Kahana-moku are considered to be in the running.

The 220-yard girls' novice will bring out good girl paddlers and picking the winner in advance will be very hard.

The 220-yard for boys under 16 will bring out a "flock" of the "young sprouts", among which it is rumored there is more than one dark horse. The speed that these youngsters will make will surprise the fans.

RIVALRY IS KEEN

Answer No. 17—Plus (right).

Penalty for interference on a forward pass cannot be inflicted unless offensive player has crossed the line of scrimmage.

Question No. 18—Team A scores a touchdown late in the fourth quarter. Timekeeper informs the referee that time was up before the play had started but that the gun failed to function.

Decision: Referee rules touchdown O. K.

Answer No. 18—Minus (wrong).
