

GREAT SWIM IDOL IN EXHIBITIONS AT NATATORIUM

**Maiola Kalili, Jean Smith Crowned Junior Champs;
Hui Makani Relay Team Also Sets Record; Many
Tourists Crowd Stands to See The Duke;
Harris Family Wins Medley Relay Race**

IT SEEMED like old times at the War Memorial natatorium last night when Duke P. Kahanamoku, Hawaii's aquatic idol and erstwhile world and Olympic champion, showed in exhibitions as part of the Duke Kahanamoku Swimfest that officially ushered in the 1930 aquatic season.

The Duke gave exhibitions of the various crawl strokes, an exhibition received by a very enthusiastic gathering, mostly visitors from the mainland. First the Duke demonstrated his famous sprint stroke. He followed with the Australian and American crawl—interesting any time to our tourists.

Duke closed his exhibition with a novelty stunt. He erected his strapping body almost perpendicular in the water and proceeded to walk.

To show that he can still "step" a fast lap, the Duke participated in the 300-meter family medley relay between the Kahanamoku family and the Harris family, which was won by the Harris family.

When the Duke swimming anchor, hit the water, Kapua Harris was a few yards ahead of him. He then began showing his spurs and swam a mighty race, closing up the gap inch by inch and at the finish nosed out Kapua Harris by a scant foot.

However, the race was awarded to the Harris family because a member of the Kahanamoku family swam the breaststroke illegally, doing the freestyle for a couple of meters. This infraction caused them to be disqualified. The same was true of the Kaupiko family who finished third.

Of course the boys did not take the race seriously, it being swum for the fun of it.

RECORDS FALL

Several new records were established during the meet, Maiola Kalili winning the 200 meters backstroke for men, Junior Championship, in 2 minutes 48 3-5 seconds, Jean Smith capturing the 100 meters, backstroke Junior Championship for girls, in 1 minute 46 4-5 seconds, and the Hui Makani relay team taking the 800 meters club relay, in 10 minutes 8 2-5 seconds.

Maiola Kalili took the 200 meters backstroke event without much trouble, although K. Wood of Outrigger made a game attempt to win the race. Hutchinson of De Russey was third.

Jean Smith swam a fine race to win the 100 meters backstroke for girls. B. Nicoll was second and G. Slight third.

The Hui Makani team was the only team to enter the 800 meters club relay. Despite the lack of competition Harvey Chilton's proteges broke the old record and incidentally captured the trophy which was put up for the event. The Hui Nalu and
