

RECORD LIST OF ENTRIES FOR ANY HONOLULU SWIM

More Than 100 Juveniles Are Schedule To Start In One of the Races

Three hundred and seven entries, the largest number of competitors ever brought together here for an aquatic event, representing nine schools, five organizations and swimming clubs, will meet at the war memorial natatorium Saturday, March 29, when the 10th weekly Star-Bulletin swimfest will be held in conjunction with two junior national A. A. U. championships.

One hundred and thirty-three juvenile paddlers ranging from 7 to 12 years of age are scheduled to start in the 50-meter freestyle for boys and girls under 13 years of age. This is by far the most interesting event be-

cause the majority of juniors entered in this event could not swim 10 weeks ago.

The feature attraction of the big splash will be the 100 meter junior national freestyle event for women and the 800 meter freestyle race for men.

Other Stars

Jean Smith of the W. S. A. of Hawaii, Lorena Hines of O. C. C., Loreta Gillespie of O. C. C., May Westcott, Barbara Baril and B. Nicoll, the three mermaids representing the W. S. A. of Hawaii, are more entrants. A new junior national century mark should be established.

Malola Kalili of Hui Makani, one of the popular winners in the weekly swimfests, heads a list of 10 entries in the 800 meter title event. Maurice Furusho, Hui Makani, Harold Hanby, Fort Shafter, and John Jula, Fort De Russy, all men who have been seen in the tank in the competitions are in the race. Many more names have been submitted, but failure to pay the entrance fee cannot make their entry official. The \$1 required for the event must be paid.

Medley for Boys

The 120 yard medley for boys under 13 will find the winner lower all previous marks established at the pool. This three style event has been popular and effective because of the daily practice in all three style of swimming as taught and coached. Thirty-four entries in this event is an indication of the ability of children in this difficult event.

In One Race

Sixty boys under 16 years of age will line up on the starting platform for the 100 meter event. This is the most interesting result of all the competitions. The first week found only eight entries and Washington junior high school has entered more than half of the number for point honors.

The 100 yard relay for boys under 13 will find 11 teams ready; the same distance for girls under 13, 14 teams. The same distance for boys under 16, the record entry of 16 teams and for girls under 16, nine teams in the freestyle event.

The Outrigger Canoe club has entered the strongest relay possible in the island against the youthful inexperienced Women's Swimming Association of Hawaii in the 400 meter relay. Olga Clark, Mildred Slight, Lorena Hines, Lotetta Gillespie and Lillie May will match their speed against Jean Smith, Barbara Baril, May Westcott and Barbara Nicoll.

Feature Relay

Another feature relay event will be the meeting of Hui Makani, Outrigger Canoe club, Fort De Russy, University of Hawaii, Washington junior high school and Nuuanu Y. M. C. A. in the 800 meter relay. This should be a great race as all teams have been swimming near the record association mark of 9 minutes 48 4-5 seconds.

Nine men are entered in the 10 foot springboard competition. This will be the final event for the swimfests in that meeting. Platform work will start next Saturday. Vernon Harry and Clarence Tsark of the University of Hawaii, Richard Loutit of Fort De Russy and Y. Kenjo and M. Oka of the Nuuanu Y. M. C. A. are men who have been seen in previous open competition.

The races will start promptly at 2:15 p. m. with the 50 meter freestyle. The gates of the natatorium will be opened at 12 noon. The tickets of admission will be handled outside of the natatorium.
