

# NATIONAL EVENTS AT NATATORIUM SWIMS SATURDAY

100 Meter Junior National  
Swim For Women Includ-  
ed On Program

Two junior national A. A. U. championships, one district title event and 20 juvenile swimming races for children will be the feature attraction at the war memorial natatorium Saturday, March 29, when over 300 entries will vie for titles, school championships and points.

Never before in the history of competition have so many actual entries been received for one big meeting. Every boy and girl who will appear, especially in the 50-meter freestyle, where there are 130 entries, are anxiously waiting for the gun.

The feature 100-meter junior national event should lower the present existing mark of 1 minute 13 seconds of the association.

Lorena Hines of Outrigger C. C. and Jean Smith of the Women's Swimming Association of Hawaii will probably splash it out for first place honors. It should be a great sprinting race.

## Record In Danger

There is no doubt but that Malola Kalili of Hui Makini will again smash the junior national record in the 800 meter freestyle. He has been doing that consistently. It will not surprise officials to see him lower the senior mark in the very near future. Maurice Furusho, John Jula, Hanby and Waidlich should give Kalili plenty of hard competition.

The record number of relays in the 160-yard freestyle event will determine the fastest quartet in the district. The entry of a team from the Andrew E. Cox junior high school of Waialua, Oahu, brings nine schools to the starting point.

## Louis Woodd Enters

Louis Woodd, brother of the sprinter, Johnny, is entered in the 100-meter freestyle for boys under 16 and will swim on the relay team for his school.

The entry of Liliuokalani junior high leaves Kalakaua junior high as the only school in Honolulu who has not at least one entry in any of the swimming events.

The 160-yard relays for girls under 13 is interesting. There are children eight years of age who have been taught to swim at the natatorium two months ago and are now capable of representing their school in competition for points and individual honors.

In order to allow the children plenty of time for dressing and securing their seats, the gates will be opened at 12 noon. One section has been assigned for all the contestants who will remain seated during the competitions.
