

CREAM OF LOCAL SWIM WORLD TO VIE FOR TITLES

Most of Hawaiian Senior Championships To Be at Stake; Outstanding Mermaids May Be Sent to Women's Nationals; Affair To Be Held at the Natatorium, June 4 and 5

THE Acme swimming meet to be held at the Memorial Natatorium on the nights of June 4th and 5th promises to be one of the best held since the Women's National last year. Nearly all of the Hawaiian Senior championships for men and women will be held. The meet will also give a line on any outstanding swimmers who might be sent to the men's and women's national meet to be held at Long Beach on July 3, 4, 5 and 6. Also, it will aid in the selection of the swimmers to be invited to swim against the Yale and Japanese swimmers who

are coming here in July.

Every afternoon the tank is crowded with the swimmers who are practicing faithfully for the meet. Judging from the times made in practice and in small meets, there should be many new records made in all classes.

The 440 yards freestyle for men will be a thriller with Bud Crabbe who has made 4:39 and Kalili who has made 5:05 but can do better. In the 220 breast stroke for women, Lily Bowmer May made 3:49 last year. However, time which has been beaten repeatedly by several girls. The 220 back stroke for men was won last year by John Kōmenaka who made 2:47 and this time has been equalled by Kalili in small meets. The 100 meters freestyle for men will bring together a classy field consisting of J. Woodd, the title holder, Bud Crabbe, M. Kalili, Sam Kahana-moku and others. In the 400 meter relay for women, the O.C.C. team will have good competition from the University of Hawaii and the W.S.C. team. These Hawaiian championships will be held on Wednesday night, June 4th.

THURSDAY'S EVENTS

The next night the first championship will be the 100 meters freestyle for women which should be taken by Lily Bowmer May who will be pressed by Rose Stimson, the new University flash, and by Lorena Hines. Both girls can do better than 1:14. The 300 meet medley for men should prove to be sensational with Budd Crabbe who has done 4:14 in practice and M. Kalili who has done 4:15. When one considers that Buster Crabbe holds the world record at 4:13 these fine performances can be appreciated. The 440 breaststroke for men will find Souza defending his title but closely pressed by the infant phenomenon Masuda who has already made under 7:00 for the distance. The 220 backstroke for women should be a gift to Lily Bowmer May but she will be pressed by Jean Smith and May Westcott who are in great form.

The 880 freestyle for men finds the old reliable M. Kalili on deck to defend his title. He is the only swim-
