

KALIHIS GRAB MOST HONORS IN ACME SWIMFEST

Second Half of Championship Meets Starts At 8 o'Clock Tonight

Swimming three seconds away from the American record in the 220-yard dorsal Hawaiian championship, Malola Kalili of Hui Makani was the outstanding individual performer in the second annual Acme meet and senior A. A. U. championship held last night at the natatorium. Malola won two individual titles.

The backstroke event was won by the star paddler in 2 minutes 39 3-5 seconds, three seconds away from the American record held by George Kojac of the N. Y. A. C., world title holder for all dorsal distances. Malola had no competition. With another good entrant in the race capable of forcing the popular swimmer, the Hawaiian association would have had another American record.

Wins in 440

Malola won the 440 yards freestyle event in 5 minutes 8 seconds. The race promised to be very fast with Buddie Crabbe, Manuella Kalili and eight others ready to force the Hui Makani speedster for a new mark. But Malola had very little difficulty after the third turn. It was a great race up to the sprinting test and with more power and speed, Malola drew away from Buddie, who just touched ahead of Manuella. It was a great race!

Lillie Bowmer May staged a real comeback in the 220 yard event, a Hawaiian championship, when she not only won her race and title, but lowered her last year's mark by 13 2-5 seconds. Lillie was clocked in 3 minutes 36 seconds against her old time of 3 minutes 49 2-5 seconds. The Hawaiian and American record is 3 minutes 17 seconds made by Agnes Geraghty of the W. S. A. here in 1929. The youthful Mae Westcott was second and B. Hammond third.

Banner Event

The 100 meters freestyle for men and Hawaiian championship was one of the banner events of the evening. The pick of the association faced the starter. The men entered the water in one splash and it was a neck and neck race for 75 meters. Condition and strength soon made itself evident and the finish was most spectacular.

The judges went into a huddle before announcing the place winners. Manuella Kalili, not to be outdone for a title by his brother, who annexed two, won the 100 meters in 61 1-5 seconds, tying the association record held by Johnny Woodd, who finished fourth.

Kahanamoku Second

Sam Kahanamoku in his first open race this year was second and Buddie Crabbe third. The rest of the men finished in very close positions. Manuella swam a very fast race. He had not been conceded a place against Buddie, Sam or Sargent Kahanamoku. The Kalili brothers in the first night secured all the association titles and points for the hard-working Harvey Chilton, their coach.

Richard Loutit won the 10-foot springboard diving championship and last year's winner, Vernon Harry, was second. Loutit of Battery "A" gave a good exhibition of consistency in his exercises, and outside of one bad dive, would have annexed a very high lead for point honors. Both men gave the public a good demonstration of fancy springboard work. Clarence Tsark of Nuuanu "Y" was third.

Wins in Medley

Mildred Slaght won the 300 meter medley championship in 5 minutes 22 2-5 seconds, defeating her clubmate, Loretta Gillespie of Outrigger, and Mae Westcott of W. S. A., who was third. Mildred swam a very pretty race, pulling away from Mae in the backstroke, and then gave a very fast exhibition of freestyle swimming.

All the other events were record-breaking performances. K. Imori, the youthful all-around champion now representing The Star-Bulletin A. A. in open competition, lowered the old mark of 31 3-5 seconds to 29 3-5 seconds in winning the 50 yards freestyle for boys under 13. K. Mural of the S. B. A. A. was second and B. Pung, Hui Makani, third.

Breaks Mark

Olga Clark smashed the old 100 yards novice mark. The Aliiolani schoolgirl and speedster won her race in 1 minute 5 3-5 seconds against the old time of 1 minute 16 1-5 seconds made in 1934. Rose Simerson of U. H. was second and
