WINS FIVE OUT OF SEVEN TITLES IN SWIMS FRIDAY

Kalili Is All-Around Aquatic Champion of Local A. A. U.; Hui Makani Win

Winning five out of seven individual senior A. A. U. aquatic titles, Maiola Kalili, the new "iron man" of the Hawaiian association, became the all-around champion and outstanding swimming luminary when the Acme meet concluded its two-night swimfest at the Waikiki natatorium last night. It was a genuine senior championship with records broken, new champions crowned and the best exhibition of speed swimming seen in Hawaii for a long time.

The new titleholder demonstrated to the officials and spectators his super all-around ability to swim any style in near record time. Maiola is a real champion! Here is what this 19-year-old Hawaiian star accomplished in the title events.

Won 440-yard freestyle—5 minutes 8 seconds.

Won 880-yard freestyle—10 minutes 56 1-5 seconds.

Won one mile—22 minutes 33 1-5 seconds.

Equals Crabbe's Mark

Maiola in swimming the 300-meter medley equaled the record held by "Buster" Crabbe and only four-fifths of a second away from the American record. Manuella was too slow to force a new record. He was second, and Sam Kahanamoku of Hui Nalu, third.

Another new sprint champion among the mermals caused a real upset and surprise, when Rose Simerson of the University of Hawaii won the 100 meter freestyle Hawaiian championship in 1 minute 11 4-5 seconds, beating the time of 1 minute 16 seconds, made last year by Mildred Slight of Outrigger.

Rose swam a very strong, heady race. This young lady, in the last 30 meters, had enough strength to outsprint Lillie B. May, the dorsal titleholder of Outrigger. Lillie was second and Lorena Hines third. It was another exciting race which caused the spectators to rush to the finish line. The Hawaiian record of 1 minute 9 4-5 seconds is held by Elnore Carratti of San Rafael, Cal.

Lillie May's Work

Lillie B. May almost became the three-style individual title holder when she won the 220 yards backstroke Hawaiian championship in 3 minutes 19 3-5 seconds. The former junior national sprint champion and popular all-around swimmer gave a real exhibition of good training and coaching. Her dorsal stroke was smooth and fast and B. Hammond, who was second, and Mildred Slight third, never had a chance with the determined titleholder. Rose Simerson spotted a three-title ambition, but Lillie convinced the officials that she still is a "mermaid champion."

The 440 yards breaststroke A. A. U. championship drew a record number of starters, but the finish was scattered and winners easily picked. H. Souza, 1928 Hawaiian titleholder, again won his event and title in 6 minutes 44 1-5 seconds, breaking his own mark by three seconds. S. Yoshikawa, swimming for Nuanuu "Y", was a close second and A. K. Pang of Hui Nalu, third. The frog race was slow. The American record of 6 minutes 19 seconds was made by Walter Spence here in 1927.

Loretta Gillespie of Outrigger won her second title when she was clocked in 6 minutes 16 2-5 seconds for the 440 yards freestyle title. Loretta started out with a fast pace and kept a few yards lead until the finish, which found Lorena Hines fighting it out for first place. The white-capped mermaid won by a foot. Mildred Slight was third.

Hui Makani Win

Hui Makani with Manuella Kalili, Johnny Woodd, Maurice Furusho and Maiola Kalili won the 880-yard relay title and Hawaiian association medals. The quartet were clocked in 9 minutes 51 seconds. Hui Nalu was second and Army third.

Harold Hanhy won the 440 yards for service men, winning the quarter mile in 5 minutes 46 3-5 seconds against the old record of 6 minutes 7 seconds. John Jula was second, W. Waidlich third.

C. Wallace of Battery A, 16th C. A., won the 100 yard dorsal race in 1 minute 17 1-5 seconds winning
