

Prizes Galore Up for Compet

AT BEACH CARNIVAL

Real Hawaiian Sports on Card

The Los Angeles Steamship company, through its publicity director S. P. Trood, cabled the Honolulu office yesterday and authorized an appropriation for three trophies for the outrigger canoe paddling and surfing race to be held as one of the events of the Kamehameha Day Water Carnival at Waikiki, June 11th.

Altogether there will be 24 cups for competition. This number, coupled with the fact that the trophies are of unusual size and value, marks the water carnival as one of the most important, from the trophy angle, ever to be staged in Honolulu.

ALL WANT TO HELP

The response which the carnival committee received from Honolulu's business firms and individuals was nothing short of one hundred per cent, showing that the people here are anxious to revive the old beach sports of Hawaii and to perpetuate them in years to come.

The events for the big day are as follows:

10:00 a. m.—Outrigger canoe sailing race for which the Pearl Harbor Yacht club will donate a silver cup to the captain of the winning canoe. In this event there will be four canoes entered by the Outrigger Canoe club; three canoes entered by the Queen's Surf Riders and two canoes by the Hui Nalu beach club. The course will run from the "cornucopia" surf to "Castle" surf, thence back to "popular" surf and over to "Queen's" surf and finish at "cornucopia" surf in front of the Royal Hawaiian hotel. Starting at 2:30 p. m., the straight surfboard paddling race will be run. In this event any type of board will be allowed.

For this event there will be three trophies for the winners. First over the finish will receive a silver cup from Mrs. Douglas King of London. Second will receive a cup from Charlie Amalu and third will be recipient of a cup from Harold Castle.

ONE MAN CANOE RACE

The second event will be the one man canoe race, using the standard six-man canoes. For this Francis Brown will give silver cups to the first three entrants to finish.

A novel event will be the canoe tug o' war as the next offering on the program. In this the three beach clubs will enter one canoe apiece and the winner of the event will receive a silver cup from Mr. William Adams, a retired visitor who is keenly interested in beach sports.

The fifth event will be a surfboard aquaplaning endurance contest for which David Kahanamoku and Clifford Kimball will give cups to the two men who stay on their boards the longest as a speed-boat tows them over the bumpy Waikiki waters.

UMA CONTEST

Slated next on the program is a Hawaiian uma or wrestling contest the contestants performing on specially built stands out in the water. For this event Clifford Kimball will give two cups to the best and second best.

The next event calls for a surfboard paddling and surfing contest in which over one hundred entrants will start. For this Major Douglas King will give a cup to the first entrant to get back to his starting point and Harold Castle will give a cup to the second and third place winners.

The eighth event, and a thriller, will be the poi honu or turtle catching contest. For this event the Royal Hawaiian hotel will give silver cups to the first three entrants who are best at that dangerous sport.

The next event will be a straight canoe paddling contest with the Inter-Island Steamship company giving three silver cups to the three best canoes.

The final event on the program, but far from the least spectacular,

will be the outrigger canoe paddling and surfing contest for which event the Los Angeles Steamship company will give three silver cups.

BIG SPORTS PROGRAM

Never before has Waikiki, or Hawaii, in fact, had such an elaborate program of sports laid out in the efficient manner with which the carnival committee has done.

The committee, with Duke P. Kahanamoku as chairman, has George McKenzie acting as secretary, David Kahanamoku representing the Hui Nalu beach club, George "Dad" Center and J. R. Farrington representing the Outrigger canoe club, Charlie Amalu representing the Queen's Surfers and B. Ogilvie representing the Royal Hawaiian Hotel Athletic association.

The water carnival is planned to be held every year from now on and bleachers will be erected in front of the Royal Hawaiian hotel to be sold at 50 cents per seat. The proceeds of the seat sale will be given to the water carnival committee as a reserve for next year's carnival.
