

# Program Is About Set for Kamehameha Day Water Sports at Waikiki; Efforts Extended To Make the Day's Event an Elaborate Affair.

**O**NE more event—an open outboard motorboat race—has been added to the program for the first annual Kamehameha Day water carnival to be held at the beach. A trophy for the outboard race has been given by Derek Perry.

The Pearl Harbor Yacht club is going to stage an "S" boat race from Pearl Harbor, finishing at Waikiki. The boats will then anchor off the beach for the afternoon's gala water fete.

Tickets for the water carnival are now on sale at the Honolulu Sporting Goods store and at the Moana, Seaside, Niunalu and Royal Hawaiian hotels.

Duke Kahanamoku, David Kahanamoku, Charley Amalu and George D. Center are almost finished with final plans for the day's events.

The water carnival committee has issued an invitation to all craft to attend the beach sports with colors flying. A chart drawn up by David Kahanamoku designates anchorages for all sorts of craft and several speed boats will be on hand to direct water traffic for the afternoon.

The array of trophies put up for the various events is the most elaborate ever seen in Honolulu. As each event finishes the winners will step

up to a specially built stand in front of the Royal Hawaiian hotel, and, in most cases, the presentation of the cups will be made by the donors.

The water carnival looms as one of the biggest sport events of the spring season and a large crowd of spectators is expected to be on the beach for the day.

The final meeting of the water carnival committee, consisting of Duke Kahanamoku as chairman, George McKenzie as secretary, David Kahanamoku representing the Hui Nalu club, Dad Center and J. R. Farrington representing the Outrigger Canoe club, Charley Amalu representing the Queen's Surf Riders and B. Ogilvie, representing the Royal Hawaiian Athletic association, is scheduled for Monday noon at the Royal Hawaiian hotel.

The work that the Kahanamoku brothers, George "Dad" Center, Charlie Amalu and the rest of the committee members are doing to make this program on June 11 a success, is one of the most outstanding efforts thus far expended to place Hawaiian sports on the calendar again. Their work has been tireless and has borne fruit, that spectators will see when the program gets under way next Wednesday.
