K. Takemura of Meiji and Y. Yasuda cannot be overlooked. These two collegiate stars have been swimming this distance as a part of their general dual competitive program, while the Yale men do not compete over the 440 ward mark.

However C. C. Leedy will represent the Eli team in that special event. A new record is expected.

Feature Race The feature race of the program will be the 600-meter relay. There is an American record of 5 minutes 32.2 seconds made for the 600 yards by the Yale team.

Captain J. Howland is the only member of the visiting Yale men who swam on that relay. However, Coach Kiphuth has six, in fact eight, men capable of lowering that mark if they have not already done it by many seconds.

The Yale mermen are sprinters and their fast exhibition in practice shows the strength and possible lowering of many intermediate times which will be taken by the large number of officials who will be on hand to help.

Coach Kiphuth has Howland, Meissimer, Harte, Leedy, Hapke, Brines, Butler Osborne, all 100meter men, and every one a member of one or more world record relay teams.

Strong Sprinters

The 100 meter race and individual times of each six men cannot help but force the prediction that a new 600-meter relay mark will be established. The fight for first place will not be completed until the last man representing Meiji, Yale and the All-Hawaiian team cross line.

All three international races should give the spectators a great thrill when the time is announced as possibly an American or world record, will be broken.
