the evening, the 200 meter breast-stroke, was next on the program. Y. Tsuruta of Japan, world's record holder, won first honors from his schoolmate, Yuki Mawatari, by 15 yards after leading throughout. Mawatari beat out Henry Souza of the Hui Makani by a hair's breadth. N. W. Millard of Yale was fourth and Mercer of Yale fifth. Tsuruta's time was 2 minutes, 53 seconds, breaking the American record of 2:55:1, held by Walter Spence.

The seventh event of the evening, the 100-meter freestyle for boys under 16, went to Daniel Toomey of the Outrigger club after a spirited race with T. Kunimura of the Bulletin. K. Toyama, also of the Bulletin was third. Toomey's time was 1:14.

Event No. 8, 100 meter freestyle for service went to A. W. Hess of Fort De Russy. W. G. Waidlich, also of De Russy was second and Wallace from the same post, third. Hess won handily in the time of 1:06:02.

FEATURE RACE

The most sensational race of the evening was next on the program. This event was the 200-meter freestyle (International). First honors went to T. Sata of Meiji with Manuella, Kalili of Hui Makani second, Alberto Zorrilla of the New York Athletic third, C. C. Leedy of Yale fourth, Sam Kahanamoku fifth, Bud Crabbe, sixth and L. B. Osborne of Yale seventh.

Kalili established a comfortable lead on the first lap and still held a good advantage at the 150 mark but weakened for the remainder of the race and Sata of Japan, came from behind to beat him in the last 10 yards. The Meiji boy's spurt was nothing short of sensational. Zorrilla, Olympic 400 meter champion also swam a beautiful race. He arrived here only Wednesday on the Manoa, consequently swam under quite a handicap.

Following the 200 meters, Mickey Reilly, of the University of Southern California, national springboard diving champion featured in an exhibition. Yale and Meiji divers vied for International honors at the same time.

OLGA BREAKS A RECORD

Olga Clarke of the Outrigger Canoe Club lowered a local record in the 100-meter freestyle for girls under 16 which followed on the program. She was clocked in 1:12:1 which is 2/5 seconds faster than her former record for this distance. Miss Clarke won handily from Muriel Swift of the Women's Swimming Association. Gladys Slight of the Outrigger club was third.

Beach boys then took over the tank for a surfboard race. Gordon May romped off with first honors after a torrid race with Richard Hollinger. Willie Whittle was third. The time was 41 2/5 seconds.

The program was brought to a close at 10:35 with the 600-meter International relay, six men to a team. Yale, Meiji, Hui Makani, and an All-Hawaii team went to the starting point. Yale took an early lead and won from Hui Makani by five yards. Manuella Kalili, swimming the last lap, started close to 15 yards behind Leedy, Yale anchor man and nearly overtook him. After the 600-meters, Yale went two more laps in an effort to lower the record for the 800 meters. Yale's times were comparatively slow in both events.
