

DETAILED STORY OF CLOSING EVENTS OF INTERNATIONAL MEET

A RUNNING story of the final events of the International swimming meet at the War Memorial natatorium last night, written at the pool, follows:

Promptly at eight o'clock the swimmers went to their marks for the 400 meter freestyle, the feature event of the evening. Included in the entries were Alberto Zorilla, Olympic champion for the distance, Clarence "Buster" Crabbe and Maiola Kalili, two of the greatest swimmers in the world today.

Crabbe and Kalili got off to a perfect start and matched stroke for stroke for the first 100 meters. Coming up the second lap Kalili forged a yard to the front. At the 300 mark, Crabbe regained this advantage and they went into the final lap with everything they had. They seemed lashed together as they propelled their strapping bodies to the finish mark. Kalili finally won out by a hair's breadth. The judges went into a lengthy deliberation before awarding a verdict.

Alberto Zorilla finished third, nosing out Osborne of Yale by a half stroke. They trailed Kalili and Crabbe by about 30 yards. Kalili's time was 4:54.4.

The 50-meter breaststroke for girls under 13 followed on the program. First honors went to Lavina Watson of the Women's Swimming association. Amie Mooklar from the same club was second and Elizabeth Joy, also of the W. S. A., was third. Miss Watson's time was 50 seconds flat.

Next on the program was the 50-meter breaststroke for boys under 13. S. Tsumoto of the Bulletin was first, K. Mural, also of the Bulletin, second, and W. Toomey of the Outrigger club, third. Tsumoto's time was 1:44 2-5 seconds.

50 TO JOHNNY WOODD

One of the fastest fields ever to gather for a sprint event, went to their marks for the next event, the 50-meter freestyle, International. Out of the field, Johnny Woodd of the Hui Makani club emerged victorious in the record time of 26 2-5 seconds. This better the former mark of 27 1-5 seconds made by Pua Kealoha in Honolulu harbor in 1924. B. Butler of Yale finished second with Sam Kahanamoku of the Hui Nalu club, third, and Bud Crabbe,

under 13, breaststroke her record being 50 seconds flat.

The American record to go a glimmering came in the 300 meters medley which was won by Buster Crabbe with Maiola Kalili second in the fast time of 4:08 2-5. Buster smashed his own previous mark of 4:12 1-5 made in California in 1929. Incidentally, Buster and Kalili had both previously tied for the Hawaiian record of this event with 4:13 flat.

The 300 meters medley swim brought out the power of that Hui Makani team and they won as they pleased.

Briefly summing up the meet it was a wonderful success and proves again that Hawaii can do big things in a big way when it comes to swimming.

Preceding the 50-meter was the 300-meter medley for boys under 16. M. Sasaki of the Bulletin finished first, T. Kunimura, also of the Bulletin, second, and Daniel Toomey of the Outrigger club, third. Sasaki's time was 5 minutes, 12-5 seconds.

KALILI WINS AGAIN

Maiola Kalili who nosed out Buster Crabbe in the 400-meter freestyle, the first event of the evening, reappeared on the scene for the next event, the 400-meter backstroke, International, and came within 1-5 of a second of the world's record held by T. Iriye of Japan. In his thrust at the world mark, Kalili broke the American record held by George Kojac by 9 1-5 seconds. His time was 5:43. The Hui Makani wonder went into the lead from the very start and defeated his nearest rival, Takemura of Meiji by a good 20 yards. K. Harris of the Central Y finished third, G. Anderson of Yale, fourth, Zorilla of New York, fifth and Osborne of Yale, sixth.

Mickey Reilly, National Springboard diving champion then featured in a 15-minute exhibition from both the springboard and the tower. His dives were beautiful, and were well received by the fans.

The 200-meter breaststroke followed the diving, first honors going to Betty Hammond with Mae Westcott second, M. Slaght, third, Elizabeth Joy, fourth and Loretta Gillespie, fifth. Miss Hammond won handily in the time of 3:46.3.

Buster Crabbe and Maiola Kalili again took over the tank, this time for the 300-meter medley. Mawatari of Meiji led the field in the breaststroke, heading Crabbe by a good six yards. In turn, Buster led Kalili by a similar margin. Swimming backstroke the second lap, Crabbe overtook the Meiji lad and Kalili, swimming brilliantly, came within a yard of Crabbe. Coming down the home stretch, swimming freestyle, Buster finished strong, leading Kalili to the finish by a good six yards. Crabbe's time was 4 minutes 8 2-5 seconds, which is a new American record. J. W. Harte of Yale was third, Hapke of Yale fourth, and Brines, also of Yale, fifth.

The tenth event, 200-meter breaststroke, service was won by W. H. Pegman of Fort DeRussy. W. Waldlich of DeRussy was second and Harold Hanby of Shafter, third. Time, 3:23.2.

The 300-meter International medley relay closed the program. Three men represented each club. Maiola Kalili, swimming his fourth race of the evening swam the backstroke lap for Hui Makani and gave Henry Souza, breaststroker, a seven yard lead. Takemura of Meiji overtook the Hui Makani boy on this lap and Manuella Kalili and Sata of Meiji took off for the freestyle on even terms. Kalili swam a gallant lap to lead the Japanese star by five yards to the finish.
