KALILI WINS AGAIN Majola Kalili who nosed out Buster Crabbe in the 400-meter freestyle the first event of the evening, reap peared on the scene for the nex freestyle, event, the 400-meter backstroke, International, and came within 1-5 of a second of the world's record held by T. Iriye of Japan. In his thrust at the world mark, Kalili broke the American record heid by George Ko-jac by 9 1-5 seconds. His time was 5:43. The Hui Makani wonder went into the lead from the very start and defeated his nearest rival, Takemura of Meiji by a good 20 yards. K Harris of the Central Y finished Harris of the Central Y finished third, G. Anderson of Yale, fourth, Zorilla of New York, fifth and Os borne of Yale, sixth.
