

# HUI MAKANI IS CONTEST WINNER

## Japanese Second, Yale Third in General Scoring

One hair-raising finish.

Two brand new American records.

The same number of new Hawaiian marks.

Tie score between Meiji and Yale. A wonderful endurance and speed exhibition by Maiola Kalili, were just a few of the notable events that marked the closing of Hawaii's first International swimming meet last night.

Buster Crabbe, greatest American swimmer since Weissmuller retired was touched out in the 400 meters free style by Maiola Kalili. It looked like a dead heat.

Yale and Meiji counted total points after it was all over and the officials decided that honors were even, 70 points for each.

Hui Makani's powerful club team captured the meet honors with 65 points while Maiola Kalili was high point scorer for the three nights with 24 against 18 for Buster Crabbe.

### REMARKABLE MEET

It was a fitting climax to one of the most colorful aquatic meets ever held in the Hawaiian Islands and the size of the crowd made it apparent that the Yale alumni and Hawaiian A. A. U. would be able to meet all expenses.

The 400 meters free style, first on the program was the thriller. Everybody said it would be and nobody would venture a prediction as to the winner. Many who saw this race will not believe that either boy won. It looked like a toss up. The judges and timers said it wasn't. They should know.

### KALILI IS SENSATION

But to our way of thinking the real sensation of the final night was the performance of Maiola Kalili of Hui Makani, who swam not once but four times, won two first places and scored unaided 18 points. Buster swam twice and recorded 8 points.

Splendid feeling prevailed throughout between the Japanese and American college men. Yale gave the Meijis a cheer and Meiji reciprocated. How these athletes had enough
