Brigham Young Gridders Will Play Rainbows

Klum Books Rocky Mountain Conference Team for Decem- ber 13

Athletic Director Otto Klum of the University of Hawaii, who is also head football coach, announced yesterday that he had signed Brigham Young, University of Provo, Idaho, to meet the Rainbows in the December 13th football game at the Stadium. A cablegram from Brigham Young officials accepted the invitation to play here.

While Saturday is the day set for the game there is just a possibility that it will be staged Friday night. This will depend upon the success of nocturnal football.

Klum had almost completed arrangements to bring the Utah Aggies, another team in the Rocky Mountain conference, here for this game but switched to Brigham Young university because that institution's football team finished ahead of the Utah Aggies last year.

Records show that Brigham Young eleven finished ahead of both the Utah Aggies and Colorado college last year, two teams that have played here. Hawaii beat Utah Aggies, 21-20, when that team performed here.

The Brigham Young team also won last year from the University of Nevada.

Practically all of last year's stars will be back at the Brigham Young this year and an exceptional strong team is expected. The team is coached by G. Opp Romney, formerly of the University of Chicago.

Duke, Doc and Arthur will pull the Red and White senior crew Saturday's regatta day blue ribbon event and the fact that these three are a few years old and just a woe in gray around the temples, form but the six in the Red and White has been enough to place the Myrtle among the crews to be watched on Regatta Day.

HAVE THE EXPERIENCE

The Myrtle seniors are of an unknown quantity in many ways but there is no denying that they have it all over their rivals in experience. Pulling with the aforementioned are Gay Harris, Henry Wicke and Bill Fincke, all three of whom have had years of gruelling experience on the harbor themselves.

All in all, if the Red and White combination works together smoothly and the old veterans hang together over the senior course, an upset may be registered by the Myrtles.

The Reds line up with Gay at stroke, Nelson at five, Withington four, Duke three, Wicke two and Fincke bow. Captain Thomas will be the crew and all Red sixes.

Interest is at the crest on the waterfront now as the crews begin tapering off for the Saturday regatta.

KAUAI ARRIVES

The arrival of Kauai yesterday served to draw the oldtime followers to the waterfront for a look at the Achi's three crews and though they took only light work yesterday, they impressed with their smoothness and easy power. Kauai will send the people into the men's junior and freeman events and girls' junior race.

With the arrival of the Hilo crews from Hilo, tomorrow will be everything set for the regatta. News from the Crescent city indicates the Hilo will enter crews in all events with the possible exceptions of the novice and intermediate races as even there Miss "Girllie" Hart hopes that Hawaii would be able to send starters to the line.
