The proposal has been made that admission be charged but that all profits be placed in a fund to cover the expenses of swimmers sent to the Olympic trials. If this plan meets with the approval of the coaches and representatives of the various swimming organizations no medals will be awarded to winners in the meets. This would cut expenses down and leave more money for the Olympic fund.
