

SHOWS CLASS IN CINCINNATI POOL

Observers Enthusiastic Over Kahanamoku's Chances To Make Comeback

CINCINNATI, O., July 12.—Duke Kahanamoku began putting finishing touches to his grand comeback campaign to show in the coming Olympic trials that he is not yet ready to be just "a grand old man" of swimming.

Together with a throng of younger aspirants, the veteran Hawaiian swimmer shot through the waters of a local pool in preparation for tests Thursday, Friday and Saturday which will determine the American Olympic swimming team of 21 men.

Complains of Heat

Despite the fact that Kahanamoku is 42 years old, the only thing he could complain about was the heat. Duke thinks that the heat might sap the swimmers' strength.

Duke did not have anything to say regarding his comeback campaign and his attempt to represent for the fourth time the United States at the international Olympic races.

He only smiled broadly.

Shows Speed

He then went into bursts of speed as he tried himself out in the pool.

Kahanamoku arrived by airplane Sunday. He plans to tackle only the 100 meters. Others to be entered in this event include the Kailili brothers, Maiola and Manuella, at one time of Hawaii and now representing Los Angeles.
