

HUI MAKANI BOY WINS HEAT, BUT DUKE ELIMINATED

Veteran Fails to Stage Comeback; Nosed Out By Two College Boys in U. S. Team Trials Held in Cincinnati.

CINCINNATI, July 13.—The truth of the old adage—they never come back—was demonstrated here again today when Duke Kahanamoku, famed Honolulu swimmer, failed to place in preliminary heats of the Olympic game trials.

Kahanamoku was defeated in the 100 meters free style by Arthur Highland, of Northwestern University, who covered the distance in 61 seconds flat, which was comparatively slow time. Ogden Dalrymple, of the University of Michigan, also finished ahead of the Honolulu swimmer.

Duke began preparations early this summer in Honolulu for an effort to place once again on the Olympic team representing the United States. As he was entered only in the 100 meters contests, today's trials eliminate him from the picture.

Among those who qualified in the hundred meters heats were Johnny Woodd, of Honolulu and Ray Thompson, of the United States Naval Academy. The best time in the heats was 60 seconds flat. The finals in this event will be held tomorrow.

Other qualifiers included Manuella and Malola Kalili, Curtis Cummings, of Los Angeles, Herb Barthels, of the University of California, John Schmeler, of Michigan University, George Fissler and John Holland of New York Athletic Club and Al Schwarz, of Chicago.

Buster Crabbe made the best time among the six entrants qualifying in the 1500 meters event covering the course in 20:29 1-5. Others included Ralph Flanagan, of Miami Beach, James C. Christy, of Michigan University, Jack Medica, of Seattle, Carl Leedy, of Yale and Ray Ruddy, of the New York Athletic Club.

HARVEY WRITES

The mail yesterday brought a letter from Harvey Chilton dated Cincinnati, July 3, and in his letter he states that before boarding a train for the east, Johnny Woodd and Jackie May worked out in the Olympic club pool, San Francisco.

No sooner had Harvey and Woodd reached Cincinnati than a trip was made to Coney Island Pool, as the natatorium is named. Harvey says: "I had them in the water for three hours and when they came out they started to feel the way they did before leaving home.

"After luncheon I had the boys right back in the pool again and worked them for two hours more. We are planning to move from a hotel in the city out near the pool, and in a few days I will start timing them. Both boys feel that the water will be fast to them in a few days—at any rate they know they are not on a joy ride and that they will have to work to make good—and believe me work they will get."
