BUSTER CRABBE QUALIFIES FOR 1.500 METERS

Kitamura Comes From Behind To Take First Place In Qualifying Heat

Japanese Threat To Win Swimming Events Appears Again This Morning

—The Japanese threat to
win the swimming events of the Olympiad appeared again today as Kusuo Kitamura, 14 year old Nipponese, de-feated Clarence (Buster) Crabbe of the United States and Jean Taris of France in the first heat of the 1,500

meter freestyle for men. Kitamura was third for the first half of the distance with Crabbe first and Taris second, but at 1,000 meters Kitamura took the lead and finished 15 yards ahead of Crabbe, who took second in a terrific race with Taris.

Kitamura's time was 19 minutes 55.2 seconds. The first two men in each heat

Crabbe led his French opponent by two yards from the 1,000 meters until the last lap, when Taris came

until the last lap, when Taris came up with a rousing finish which fell short of beating Crabbe only by inches as the United States swimmer answered the challenge.

James Cristy of the University of Michigan won the second heat by a wide margin over Andrew Charleton, 1924 champion from Australia, and Sunao Ishibarada of Japan.
