

VETERAN NATATOR CAPTURES FEATURE WAIKIKI SPLASH

Outrigger Club Holds Annual Swims—Gladys Slaght
Takes Women's Feature—Sea Is Choppy
But Times Recorded Very Good

"TROOTS" MINVIELLE, veteran of many aquatic campaigns, repeated his triumphs of 1924 and 1929 in the annual Castle swim, sponsored by the Outrigger Canoe club, yesterday when he outclassed the field and crossed the finish line in front of the Waikiki club more than 75 yards ahead of his closest rival.

Minvielle swam a powerful race. He set a fast pace from the outset and kept widening the gap between himself and Wilbur Craw, who finished second, as the race progressed. Displaying great condition, the result of conscientious training, the veteran distance swimmer nary showed a sign of fatigue at the finish. His time was 31 minutes 40 35 seconds.

A large field, close to 160 natators, took part in the various events scheduled for the day. Of the number, 140 performed under the colors of the University of Hawaii, which institution staged a meet of its own in conjunction with the Outrigger club's annual Thanksgiving Day program.

RACES ARE KEEN

In all, six events were held yesterday and they were productive of keen races.

It was in 1924 as a youngster that Minvielle first won the annual Castle swim, the distance of which is about one and a quarter mile. During the ensuing four years, he met with indifferent success, but in 1929, he staged a comeback and burst forth to renewed glory when he emerged victorious once more against a fast field. And yesterday, he repeated his victories of the former years.

The sea was rough and choppy yesterday but it worked no handicap on Minvielle. Making good use of the experience gained in the races of bygone years, the veteran natator swam a powerful race and simply outclassed his opponents.

Wilbur Craw was second in the race. He put up a game fight to keep up with the veteran champion, but found the going plenty tough. Despite the fact that he finished more than 75 yards behind the winner, he made a great showing. Jimmy Hurd was third.

In the women's open event from the Public Bath to the beach, Gladys Slaght emerged victorious. She dis-

played superlative form and outdistanced Jennie Woodd Harris who captured second place. Dorothy Hammond was third.

Miss Slaght's winning time was 21 minutes 11 4-5 seconds.

Gay Harris, former Olympic star, and still a swimmer of no mean ability won the Public Bath swim for men over 30, beating Johnny Hollinger. The two staged an interesting race. Harris' time was 25 minutes 12 4-5 seconds.

In the Public Bath swim for boys under 18, Harold Sexton came through with flying colors. Tom Carter was second. Sexton's time was 19 minutes 13 2-5 seconds.

And in the Cunha swim for boys under 16, Hollinger won. He was the only swimmer entered from the Outrigger club. Leandro and Arizumi, swimming for the Natatorium club finished second and third, respectively.

Georgina Cooper captured first place in the girls novice Cunha swim, leading Jean Pope to the finish line by a score of yards. Miss D. Brown was third. Miss Cooper's time was 14 minutes 52 4-5 seconds.
