

# Gladys Slaght, Minvielle Capture Feature Swims

Splashing his way over the finishing line easily 75 yards ahead of Wilbur Crow, his nearest rival, A. E. (Toots) Minvielle, winner in 1924 and 1929, yesterday captured the blue ribbon event, the Castle swim, in the annual Outrigger Canoe club's open water aquatic program.

Minvielle's time for the distance, which was well over a mile and a half, was 31 minutes 40 3-5 seconds. Jimmy Hurd was third.

Gladys Slaght, one of Hawaii's leading girl swimmers, had little difficulty winning the blue ribbon event for women when she took the Public Bath's swim in 21 minutes 11 4-5 seconds. Jennie Woodd Harris was second and Dorothy Hammond third.

Miss Slaght was in excellent condition and displayed a form that bids fair to make the enthusiastic ones look up. She took the lead from the start and increased it, apparently, with every stroke.

By winning the event, Miss Slaght won the trophy offered by The Star-Bulletin. The distance was less than a mile.

Gay Harris repeated his triumph of last year in the race for men over 30 years of age. He covered the distance in 25 minutes 12 4-5 seconds. Johnny Hollinger was second after offering Harris plenty of competition.

### Promising Boy

Harold Sexton took the public bath's swim for boys under 18 in 19 minutes 13 2-5 seconds. Sexton displayed a lot of promise in the race and should be heard from in the future. His time was considered very good. Tom Carter was second.

In the Cunha surf event, Hollinger, only Outrigger club entry, defeated Leandro and Arizumi of the Natatorium club. This event is for boys under 16.

In the girls' novice, Georgina Cooper was winner over Jean Pope by about 25 yards. D. Brown was third. The time caught for the victor of this race was 14 minutes 52 4-5 seconds.

### Dean Meet

About 150 swimmers, mostly made up of University of Hawaii students, participated in the day's events. The university swimmers staged a meet of their own in conjunction with this swim. Theodore (Pump) Searle was in charge.

Considering that the sea was rough and there was a lot of wind, the times chalked up in the various events were considered excellent.

The meet was efficiently handled by Gay Harris and his committee.
