Winning OCC pulls a fast shuffle

Outrigger Canoe Club danced to a fast (crew) shuffle while winning yesterday's Kamehameha Day regatta at Kailua Beach for the second year.

"A little early-season experi-mentation," said Steve Scott, coach of Outrigger's adult men's crews. "Just shuffling crews," added Ed Pickering, OCC's

women's coach. Outrigger's junior men's and women's crews were called on to ping women pulled off another

A single OCC men's crew won the junior race, then went on and finished first in the senior heat. "The rules allow us to move a crew up (from junior to senior) during the season, but not down," the tactically-minded Scott said.

Rough waters and runaway buoy flags did little to deter Outrigger Canoe Club from winning its second straight Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association overturn. The No. 5 paddler regatta title of the season yester-

The defending state champs easily outdistanced runnerup Kailua Canoe Club, 94-69, in the Pops Waialeale Regatta at windy, rain-swept Waimanalo Beach. In the small-club division (15 crews and under), Anuenue Canoe Club earned the title with 20 points.

Helped by the coaches' decision to allow open steering in the first 10 events, OCC used several of its veteran steersman to win the boys and girls 12 races and come in second in the boys 13 and 14 and girls 13. Open steering is allowed when conditions are deemed too hazardous for the younger or inexperienced steersman to handle the 400-pound koa canoes.

CHOPPY CONDITIONS and rain squalls delayed the start of firsts for Lokahi of Honolulu. the regatta from 8:30 a.m. until 10:15. Though a surprising low final two events of the day number of hulis (overturnings) Ka Mo'i won both the men's occurred, quarter-mile turning open four and adult mixed for flags broke loose several times 10 points, while Lokahi was fifth during the day. Noted journalist 'Ted' Scripps dies at 57

Edward W. "Ted" Scripps, a trustee of the Scripps Howard news organization and Pacific affairs, died Sunday while aboard a flight from Honollulu to Australia. He was

Scripps boarded Continental Airlines Flight 15 to Sydney just



after midnight Sunday. About two hours before arriving, pilot William Ashton radioed Sydney airport to report that Scripps was seriously ill, according to a Continental spokesman. A short time later, Ash-

ton radioed to report that Scripps had died.

Scripps was on the first leg of a fact-finding visit around the Pacific rim, an area in which he was an expert. He was traveling with the Pacific Forum, an organization in which he was a direc-

Locally, he was a director of the Pacific & Asian Affairs Council of Honolulu. He also recently returned to writing, Other obituaries on D-3

a prominent figure in local journalism and. serving as a reporter on Pacific Affairs for the Scripps Howard News Service, which was founded by his grandfather, Edward W. Scripps.

He was the youngest of three brothers who served as trustees of the E.W. Scripps Trust, which owns and operates Honolulu. the multi-media company that publishes some 20 daily newspapers, several weeklies and, through Scripps Howard Broadcasting, owns eight TV stations, several radio stations, and cable TV stations.

When Scripps moved to Hawaii in 1969. he became interested in local maritime af-

Two years ago, Scripps conceived the idea of bringing back "boat day" to the Honolulu waterfront. Contributions since then have funded the appearance of the Royal Hawaiian Band each time a foreign ship has arrived at the waterfront. He also wrote a series of articles about

The United Press, founded by his grandfather, hired Scripps for his first reporting job, which was interrupted by the Korean

War. He then served two years of active duty aboard a destroyer in the Pacific. He returned to the United Press which merged with the Hearst organization's International News Service to become United Press International - as a writer on the Washington desk.

In 1965, he assumed responsibilities as vice president and assistant secretary of the Scripps Howard company's New York operations. Locally, he was also a member at the
