# The drive to return America's Cup to America surges into overdrive

The United States has accelerated its bid to win back the America's Cup. Challengers throughout America are raising millions of dollars to construct high-technology, 12-meter yachts on which to train and race.

C.S. Lovelace, publisher of "The Nautical Quarterly," wrote, "The American campaign to bring the Cup Back Home is the greatest effort ever undertaken for a sporting event in history. Today, 10 American 12-meter syndicates are going for the cup, each gearing up with budgets in excess of \$10 million."

The competition begins in October 1986 with a three-month series of elimination races to select the challenger. The challenger and the Australian defender meet January 31, 1987, in the start of the best four-of-seven match races for the Cup. The race will be sailed approximately 10 miles north of Fremantle Harbor in Australia.

Here is some current information about the America's Cup, and its effect on Hawaii:

● One of the 10 American challenges made to the Royal Perth Yacht Club, defender of the cup, was under the burgee of the San Diego Yacht Club, which has involved 30 affiliate yacht clubs. One of the affiliates is Honolulu's Waikiki Yacht Club, whose efforts are being coordinated by chairman Stan Thornton, Cy Gillette, Dick Gooch, Ken Morrison and Fred Smales.

● A 12-meter council named "The Sail

America Foundation for International Understanding," was formed to sponsor and oversee fund-raising efforts for San Diego Yacht Club's "America's Cup Challenge '87."

● Dennis Conner, a three-time defending Cup helmsman, is affiliated with the Challenge '87 effort. Conner has a personal interest in the competition, as he was at the helm of Liberty when America lost the Cup to Australia in 1983. He will skipper the Challenge '87 yacht in the trials.

● Officials of "Challenge '87" have announced that 1986 spring and summer crew training will be in Hawaiian waters. Headquarters will be at Waikiki Yacht Club. Officials and crew will go from Hawaii to Fremantle with their final 12-meter selection of yacht and crew.

# Outrigger gains easy victory

On a casual day in Waimanalo, the Outrigger Canoe Club took anything but a teisurely approach toward its Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association opponents.

OCC amassed 108 points yesterday to easily win the Pop Waialeale Regatta off Waimanalo Beach. Kailua was second with 79 points and Hui Nalu third with 43.

Hui Lanakila placed first in the A Division with 21 points. A Division is for clubs entered in 15 or less races.

In Na Ohana O Na Hui Wa'a's Kamehameha Regatta at Kailua Beach, Ka Mo'i Canoe

Club won nine events to gain an easy victory.

A crowd of about 3,000 attended the annual Waialeale beach-party program, which featured musical performances and food booths.

Outrigger, unbeaten in three regattas this season, surpassed the 100-point mark for the third consecutive week.

OCC scored 102 points in the Kamehameha Day Regatta two weeks ago and 106 points in last week's Leeward Regatta.

Although official records are not kept, several race officials said it was the first time a club has scored at least 100 points three times in a season.

"That's amazing," Hui Nalu coach Kala Kukea said. "Be-

fore, teams would win with 60 now, but you can't slow down."

Said Kailua coach Beanie Heen: "We score 79 points and finish second. Last year, we would have kicked teams with that score."

Last year, in fact, Kailua juggled its lineup and came away with a narrow victory over Outrigger in the OHORA championship regatta. Outrigger, which had dominated the OHORA until that meet, learned a lesson that day.

"We definitely won't forget that too quickly," Outrigger assistant coach Walter Guild said. "You can't worry about it. But you sure have to think about it."

"You have to remind your paddlers, 'You may look good

now, but you can't slow down. There was no letup for Outrigger yesterday, despite competing in the roughest racing conditions of the season: strong winds and tumble-wash currents.

OCC entered 27 of 30 events and scored points in 25. For the record, it placed first in 18 races and second in five. OCC actually finished first in 19 races, but its junior men's crew was disqualified because of a false start.

Despite its strong showing, Guild was cautious in offering praise.

"I think a lot of it has to do with the weather. It was just a
