Hawaii's Cho wins air-gun competition

HOUSTON — Michael Cho of Kailua Oahu finished with 2,360 points to win the air-gun competition of the National Wheelchair Games yesterday.

Cho edged Tom Paumier of Minerva, Ohio by one point in the three-day competition. Cho competed in the quadriplegic with assistance division, setting records in the prone, standing, kneeling and aggregate categories.

Cho, a McKinley High School graduate, is paralyzed from the neck down, the result of a football injury he suffered while at Willamette University.

He is rated a Class 1-A, the highest category of quadriplegics and uses adapted equipment in competition.

Winners in the games will determine most of the team that will compete next year at the Paralympic Games in Seoul, South Korea.

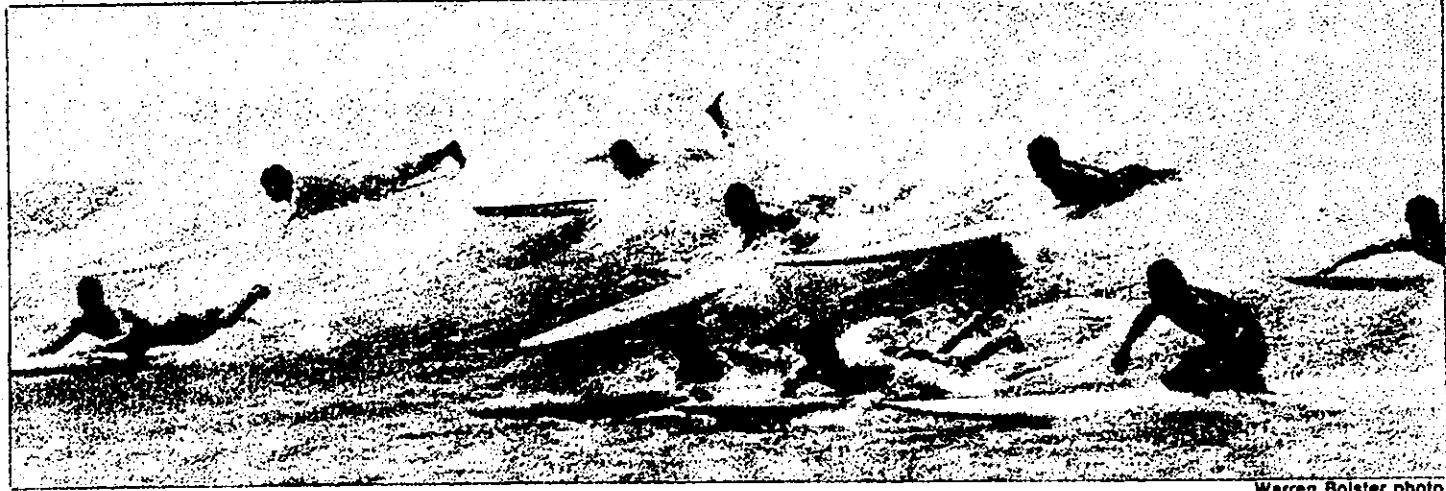
