Several promotions at Bank of Hawaii

Bank of Hawaii has announced several promotions and appointments.

Pauling home gets architectural award

The residence of Dr. Linus Pauling Jr. on Round Top Drive has received the 1986 Hawaiian Architectural Arts Award as an outstanding example of design that reflects Hawaii's unique natural and cultural environment.

Gov. John Waihee presented the award, sponsored by the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts with assistance from the Hawaii Society/American Institute of Architects, at

the Governor's office Tuesday.

Accepting the award were Pauling, his wife Stephanie, and the architect Pauling commissioned to design his home, Vladimir Ossipoff.

In making the presentation Governor Waihee said "(This award) is not just a recognition of good design, although without good design the project celebrates would not succeed, but it honors the people who

commission and create architecture that expresses Hawaii, the beauty and diversity of its land and its people."

The jury for the award was comprised of five distinguished Hawaii architects.

The jury noted the architect's "sensitive use of the challenging Tantalus rain forest site, the incorporation of the arts and crafts of Hawaiian and Pacific Rim peoples into the home's open, informal plan, and the

blend of natural materials, many native to Hawaii, in both the interior and exterior design."

Ossipoff, has been a practicing architect for over 50 years. He was born in Russia, raised in Japan, and educated in California. Besides residences, he has designed many other Hawaii facilities, including projects for the Queen's Medical Center, the Pacific Club, and the Outrigger Canoe Club.

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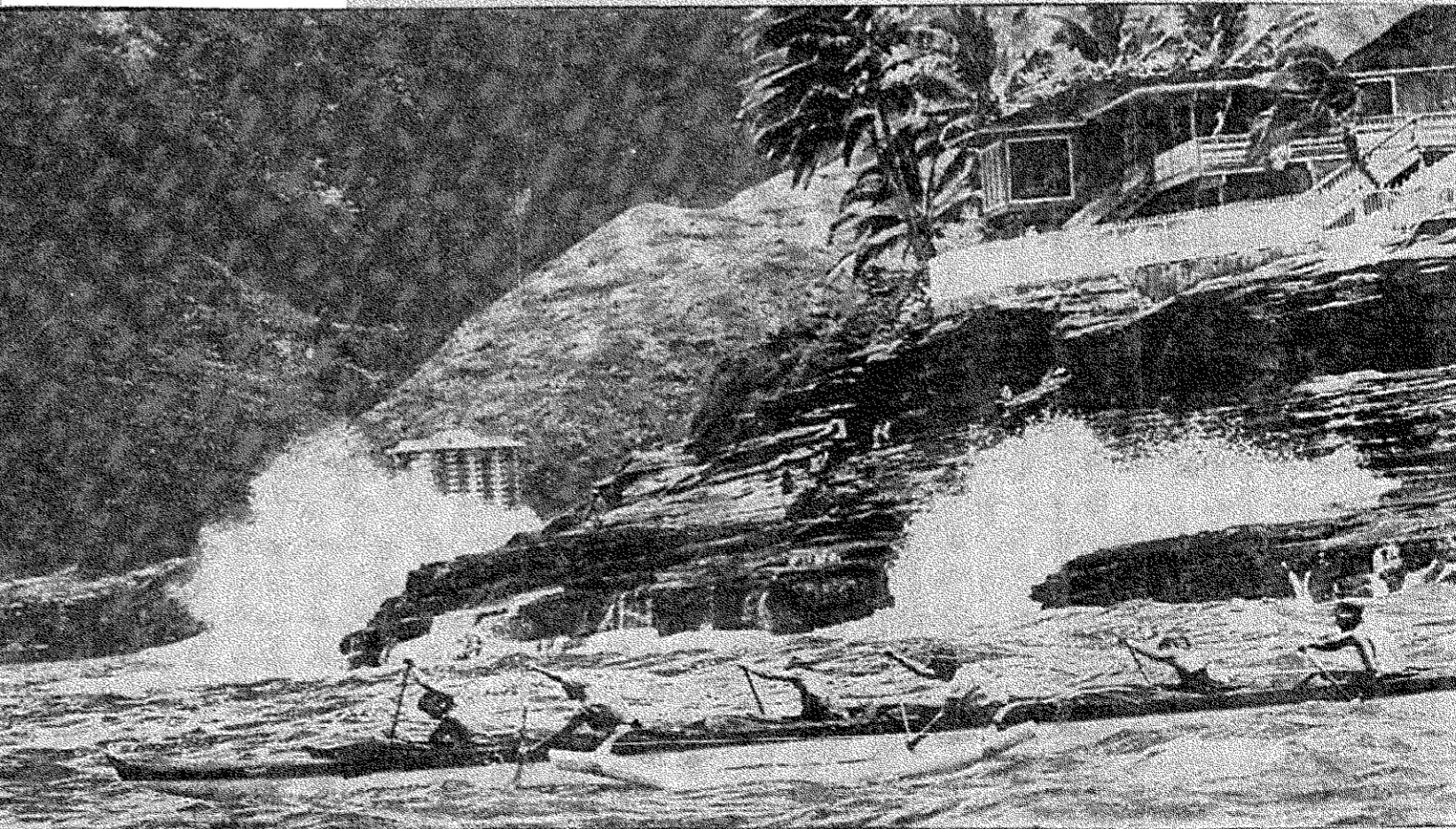

Police Beat
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Outrigger Club sauna burns

A piece of cloth, perhaps a towel or clothing, was ignited near a hot coil of a sauna at Outrigger Canoe Club yesterday, triggering a \$25,000 fire.

The redwood of the sauna went up in flames that reached into a women's locker room.

No one was hurt in the 5:24 p.m. fire. Firefighters led by Capt. Wayne Nofjiri of the Waikiki station brought the fire at 2909 Kalakaua Ave. under control at 5:39 p.m. and extinguished it at 6:11.

"Most of the damage would probably be smoke damage," Nofjiri said.

Fire did \$25,000 damage to the women's locker room at the Outrigger Canoe Club last night. Five engine companies were called to the 5:24 p.m. blaze after a club member reported seeing flames. Firefighters had the blaze under control by 5:40 p.m. Investigators said the fire apparently started when a flammable material was placed too close to a heating element in the locker room sauna.
