

# **OCC Paddlers Solid Favorites**

Saturday's Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association State Championships at Keehi Lagoon Park shapes up to be another ho-hum, all—Oahu

paddle-off. "Only five clubs entered enough crews to qualify for the top Triple A division," a disappointed Joan Malama said. The Oahu HCRA president said that, of the five, defending champ Outrigger, Kailua and Hui Nalu canoe clubs are heavily favored to sweep the top three places in that order.

Malama said that Healani and Maui's Hawaiian Outrigger qualified for Triple A, but



with just the minimum number of crews. "They stand little chance of winning the team title," she added.

SATURDAY'S 39-club championship is grouped into three divisions-AAA for clubs participating in 16 or more of HCRA's 31 events; AA for clubs entering seven through 15 races, and A for clubs fielding six or fewer crews.

"Apparently, the Neighbor Islands are feeling the same paddler shortage as Oahu," Malama said. In past years, Hanalei (Kauai) and Kai Opua (Hawaii) were the Neighbor Island clubs to beat.

Saturday's championship suffered another blow when Hui Wa'a Association's unde-feated Ka Mo'i of Waianae elected not to enter the meetafter its koa canoe failed to pass HCRA's measurement test. "They (Ka Mo'i) could have borrowed a legal boat had they really wanted to race," paddler Mark Halloway

Added Malama, "There goes our dream match between the two unbeatens (Outrigger and

THE HCRA regatta begins at 8 a.m. and continues throughout the day. Food and souvenirs will be available at booths. Parking will be ample and no admission will be

charged.

Although Outrigger is heavily favored to win the team title, it'll be hard pressed to score its usual 100 or more points. "I know that Kailua crews are working hard to beat them. They want. Outrigger badly," Malama said.

Outrigger has several winning crews but none more successful than its Boys-18s. Coached by auto magnate Jimmy Pflueger of Honolulu, the crew went undefeated as Boys-16s two years ago and kept its streak alive after graduating into the 18s. "The boys are out to win big on Saturday," Pflueger said.

Brothers Mark and Todd Sandvold, along with Howie Klemmer and Pflueger's son, Alan, are the crew veterans. Mike Sterling and Paul Friese signed on fresh this season. "I hope they find some competition on Saturday," their coach said, "because up to now they haven't had much.

ALTHOUGH Outrigger, Kailua and Hui Nalu have had little problems filling crew positions, most other Oahu clubs are scrambling for paddlers. "This season's low turnout came as a shock," Malama said. She said OHCRA officials are determined to find out the reason.

Fred Hemmings, a champion surfer and long-time Outrigger paddler, says the sport has serious organizational problems. "Clubs are started with few paddlers and never get off the ground," he said, 'plus there are too many

Hemmings said that some blue-ribbon events, like the men's and women's senior races, have low turnouts. "These races should be the feature events," he said. Hemmings suggested that weak clubs merge to make strong

"Don't get me wrong," he added, "I appreciate the wellmeaning volunteers, coaches and officials. They try hard. But some of their work, unfortunately, is counterproductive."

Hemmings said he believes that although the local organizational structure is in shambles, the sport can be saved. "Paddling, just like any sport, needs to be professionally promoted," he said.
