

Lahaina and Kihei keying for Molokai Channel challenge

WAILUKU - When experts rate chess moves, they place an exclamation point after an excellent move, and a question mark after a move that could be either good or bad.

One month into Maui's long distance canoe racing season, a question mark and an exclamation point have taken up positions behind two Maui crews of opposite gender.

The exclamation point has zipped into place behind the Lahaina women's crew. The question mark has taken up a resting place in the waters off Kihei, eying the efforts of Kihei men's crew.

Lahaina's women started wooing the exclamation point earlier this year at the state regatta championships, when the women paddled to a convincing win in the junior

"It was a great win for us, a real confidence builder," Ann Perry, Lahaina's steerswoman said after the race. "The women from Outrigger couldn't believe that we beat

But beat them they did, and one week later, the Lahaina women followed the championship paddle with a solid victory at the Queen Kaahumanu distance race off Kahului. Last Saturday they added a win at the Kauikeouli distance race (Maui to Lanai) to their string of vic-

The three victories, plus a July 21 win at the John Kukahiko distance race, prompted Lahaina coach Glenn Perry to rate his women's chances at this year's Molokai channel race as very high.

'We're really high on the women,''
Perry said. "We're optmistic that they'll have a good showing at

success has been the number of women turning out for practice. "We've got about 18 women

working for the 12 seats (six starting paddlers, plus six relief paddlers); that's one of the reasons why we're so high on our chances in the Molokai race," Perry said. "The west side has always had strong women's crews, but there hasn't ever been the depth like we have this year. There's a lot of competition for those seats."

One seat that will definitely add a sharp edge to Lahaina's chances in the channel race is seat number six, or the steerswoman's seat. Ann

The race from Molokai to Oahu is the high point of the season for men and women distance paddlers. For this year's race, crews are expected from Canada, Tahiti and the mainland. No Maui crew has ever won the race from Molokai to Oahu.

To prepare for the event, which will be held Sept. 22 for the women (Na Wahine O Ke Kai), and Oct. 13 training his crew four days a week, Lahaina, Maui's top women's distance crew, displays its winning style in the Queen Kaahumanu distance race Aug. 11 totaling 30 to 40 miles of paddling a week. A finish in the top 10 at the channel race would go a long way towards helping spark interest in long distance paddling on Maui; it would also go a long way towards erasing a question mark.
