OCC to launch Cup challenge?

☐ The canoe club may be Hawaii's second challenger for the America's Cup

The Outrigger Canoe Club has informally agreed to team with a Californian and a New Zealander to become Hawaii's second challenger in two weeks for the 1992 America's Cup race if a pending court decision upholds that the event will be held in New

Sailors Bud Tretter, owner of the Marina Shipyard in Long Beach, and yachting industry executive Tom Walters, of New Zealand who lives in California, and Outrigger officials will make a formal announcement of the joint effort "very soon," said Fred Smales, former state chairman of the Hawaii for America's Cup Committee. Smales made his comments during a luncheon speech yesterday at the Ha-

waii Maritime Center. The Waikiki Yacht Club and Ameri-

ca's Cup veteran sailor Peter Isler announced July 11 that they had joined forces in challenging for America's

Tretter, 57, in a telephone interview yesterday from California, confirmed the joint challenge with Outrigger due, primarily, because of the financial backing of a wealthy OCC member and sailing enthusiast.

"I expect an official announcement within a month," said Tretter who declined to name the backer.

John Goss, an Outrigger vice president, through an assistant declined comment on the report, except to say it is "quite premature."

The formal challenge announcement remains on hold until a New York appeals court makes its decision on whether it will uphold a lower court decision that gave the America's Cup to New Zealand's Mercury Bay Yacht Club. Such a ruling would allow American syndicates to challenge for the Cup in New Zealand waters.

If the court rules the Cup is to be returned to the San Diego Yacht Club, which lost the trophy to New Zealand following several legal battles, then the

SDYC would become the defender and no U.S. syndicates would be allowed to challenge for the trophy. The court decision is expected within 30 days, Smales said.

Tretter said the sailors' agreement with the Outrigger "right now is all handshakes and verbal" until the court makes its decision. Smales, who attended a recent Outrigger board of directors' meeting about the club's participation in the Cup challenge, also confirmed that the group has reached a tentative "handshake"

agreement. Part of the deal insures that the Outrigger Canoe Club is not legally or financially responsible for any part of the challenge, Tretter and Smales said.

Tretter said he and Walters an-Auckland, New Zealand their Hawaii-based Cup challenge "with Outrigger's approval."

The two sailors have not yet found a skipper for their challenge or named their syndicate which they had planned to call the "Hawaiian America's Cup Challenge' until learning that title is regis-

tered, Tretter said. If New Zealand is upheld as the Cup's defender, Outrigger must qualify as a yacht club as required under America's Cup and Hawaii ; yachting regulations which require that any club requesting the right to challenge or join the Hawaii Yacht Racing Association must hold at least one annual regatta open to all other clubs, Smales said.

"(Outrigger officials) thought facetiously that a canoe regatta

would qualify," he said.

Smales said Outrigger "probably" will not have a hard time meeting the yacht club qualification "if they approach it intelligently and promotly."

"I think they'll have to meet the qualification requirement before their challenge is submitted, that nounced three months ago in is within 30 days after the court's decision," Smales said.

Tretter estimates his challenge will cost \$20 million to \$25 million.
