Molokai sweeps field in race to Friendly Isle

WAILUKU — In Hawaiian outrigger canoe racing action Saturday, Molokai Canoe Club paddled record times in three divisions and collected three first-place finishes at the Maui-to-Molokai long distance race. Molokai's men finished first overall and first in the men's division with a record time of 3:19.48, eclipsing Molokai's 1983 record of 3:42. Molokai's women captured the women's event (fifth overall) in 3:39.54, surpassing its 1983 record of 4:20.09. And Molokai's master men finished in 3:39.54 (sixth overall) to establish a record for the newest division in the race. Six crews competed in the race from Fleming Beach, Maui, to

Kaunakakai, Molokai. Kihei Canoe Club was the only Maui club entered in the race. Kihei's men finished second overall (3:21.14), and its mixed crew (men and women) finished fourth overall (3:39.37).

"We tried to get off the start a little faster this time," Kihei coach Mike Gerry said. "Our starts have been really slow all year and we've had to play catch-up. So we changed some people around in the canoe and tried to get off the line faster this time. It helped us, but Molokai still took the lead from the start. We stayed in there, though. At one point near the end of the race we were within three

boat lengths of Molokai. The best thing about the race was the ceremonies afterwards. The Molokai people were great. The other Maui clubs really missed a great celebration."

Auntie Genoa Keawe and the Nuanuu YWCA Hula Halau, Carol Lee Nishi directing, performed at the awards ceremony.

On Oahu, Lahaina Canoe Club's women finished fourth overall, second in fiberglass, at the Dadcenter distance race from Lanikai to Waikiki. The west side women finished the 25-mile race in 3:29:41. **Outrigger** finished first overall (3:18:58) and first (second overall) in glass (3:26:30). Hui Nalu finished

third overall (second in koa) with a time of 3:27:22.

"Outrigger pretty much took the lead from the start," Lahaina steerswoman Ann Perry said.

"They're very strong. I think our chances are still very good for the Molokai race. Our crew was hit pretty hard by food poisoning last week, so the women were feeling beat. We just didn't have it in us to power through the last part of the race."

Outrigger action continues this Saturday when crews from Kahana, Kihei, Lahaina, and Na kai Ewala travel to Hawaii for the Queen Liliuokalani distance race.
