Ideta, Ouchi claim national parks tennis titles

LONG BEACH, Calif. — It was Maui No Ka Oi yesterday at the 42nd annual National Public Parks Junior Tennis Championships.

Lahaina's Ryan Ideta won two titles in the boys' 16s division, while Lanika's Kimmie Ouchi claimed the singles crown in the girls' 16s.

Ideta, seeded No. 1 in singles, won the title, 4-6, 5-2, retired, when No. 3 Albin Polonyi, of Kansas City, Mo., broke his thumb going for a return in the first game of the final set. Ideta then teamed with Polonyi, who played with a taped hand, to capture the doubles championship with a 7-5, 6-2 victory over Taiwan's Wei-Yu Su and Jai-Yen Tsai.

Ideta, who will be a junior at Lahainaluna in the fall, won the Hawaii State High School championship in April.

Ouchi, seeded No. 2, rallied from a 4-1 deficit in the second set to defeat Stephanie Lansdorp, of Rolling Hills Estates, Calif., 6-3, 7-5 to claim the title.

Ideta and Ouchi are entered in the 29th annual Glendora Junior Tennis Championship,

starting tomorrow in Glendora, Calif.

Kollmeyer leads JAL: Professional Keith Kollmeyer fired a 4-under-par 68 yesterday to open up a two-stroke lead after the second round of the 17th annual Japan Airlines Rainbow Open golf tournament at the Mililani Golf Course.

Kollmeyer has a 36-hole total of 10-under 134. Fellow pro Lance Suzuki, with his second consecutive 68, is at 136 heading into today's final round.

Pro Casey Nakama, whose 66 was the best round of the day, moved into a three-way tie for third with pro Dan Nishimoto and amateur Merv Matsumoto at 139. Nishimoto shot a 68, while Matsumoto remained in contention with a 70.

Eagle Bowl soars: It will be the Eagle Aloha Bowl for another four years as the Aloha Bowl and the Eagle Division of Chrysler Corp. signed a new four-year contract yesterday.

The agreement was announced jointly by Marcia Cherner, president and executive director of the Aloha Bowl, and Ken Laurence, in charge of national advertising for the Eagle Division of Chrysler.

"We put some ink on the paper," said Laurence. "We have signed another four-year contract. The Aloha Bowl is grow-

ing and we want to be a part of it."

Lenny Klompus, the chief operating officer for the Aloha Bowl, said that "we got together for about three hours and then signed. We are extremely happy to have Eagle as our title sponsor for another four years."

Last season, University of Hawaii made its bowl debut in the Aloha Bowl, losing to Michigan State, 33-13.

PAL tops in PONY: Kelii Kiakona drove in the first three runs and Kevin Fujioka added a solo home run to lead Honolulu PAL to a 5-4 win over Kauai in the championship game of the PONY Asia-Pacific Zone Palomino (17-18) Division at Moanalua High School yesterday.

Kauai's Troy Fujii drove in three runs with a triple in a four-run rally in the top of the seventh inning, but the comeback fell short when Fujioka came on in relief and shut down the rally.

Lokahi, Outrigger canoe clubs dominate Oahu championships

WINDWARD — Outrigger and Lokahi canoe clubs cruised their way to the Oahu championships in their respective association races this past weekend at Keehi Lagoon.

Outrigger dominated the AA division (more than 15 crews) at the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association Oahu finals Sunday with 103 points. Hui Nalu took second with 53, followed by Kailua with 45. Healani finished fourth with 40 and Lanikai was fifth with 13.

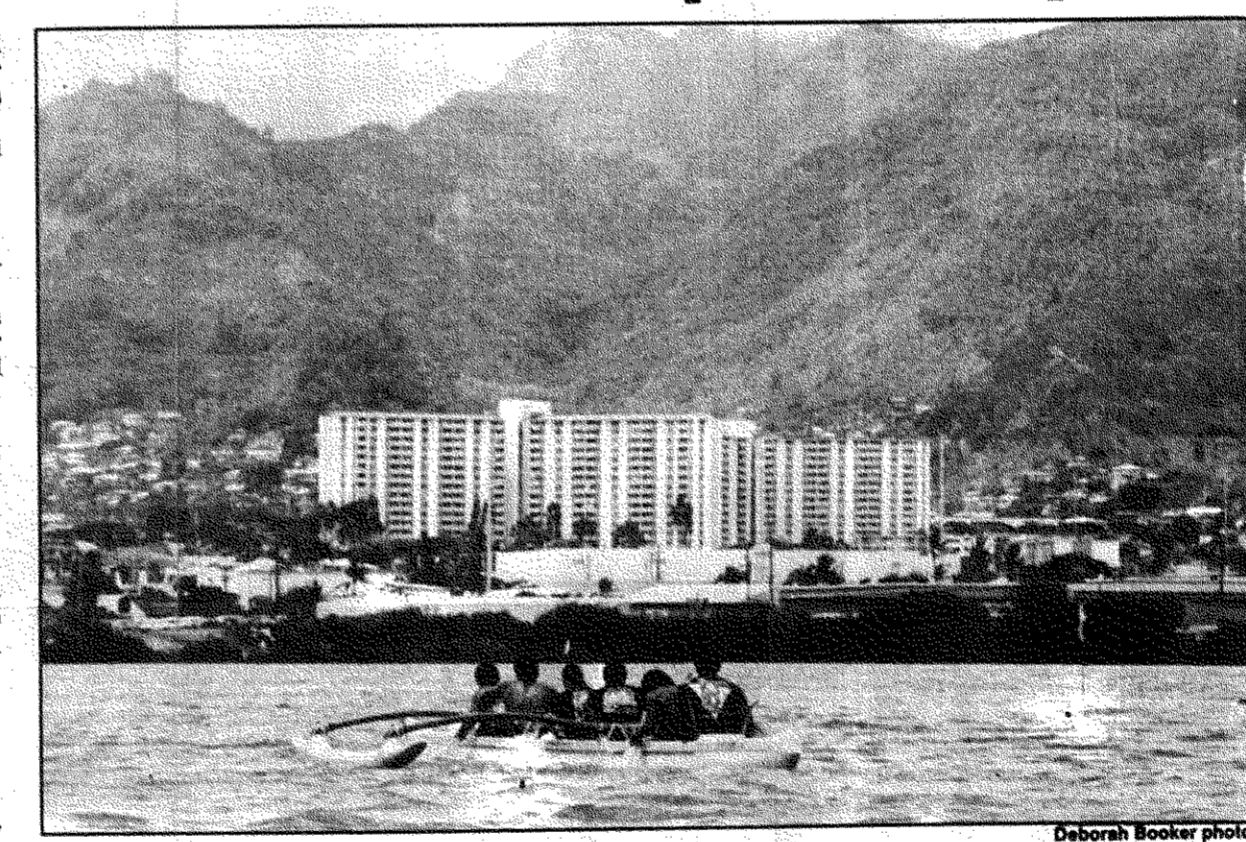
Hui Lanakila won the A division (fewer than 15 crews) with 47 points. Waimanalo was third with 12.

In the Na Ohana O Na Hui Wa'a Oahu championships Saturday, Lokahi ran away with 79 points in the AA division. Manu O Ke Kai was second with 42 with Ka Moi taking third with 35.

Kamehameha won the A division with 42 points. Kaneohe and Windward Kai came in second and third with 28 and 17 points, respectively.

The Hui Wa'a championships saw 12 records set out of the 31 races. There also were several new marks in events that changed distances from the previous years.

Both associations will be off this weekend as they gear up for the state championships Aug. 4 at Hanalei Bay on Kauai. The top four finishers in their respective events from the Oahu cham-

Canoe Paddling Hui Nalu nets second at Oahu championship

HAWAII KAI — Hui Nalu captured first place in four events to finish second at the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association's Oahu championships Sunday at Keehi Lagoon.

Hui Nalu's 53 points was no match for the heavily favored Outrigger Canoe Club, which tallied 103.

The next regatta will be for the state championship on Aug. 4 at Hanalei Bay on Kauai.

The highlight of the day for Hui Nalu was the record set by its sophomore men in the 1.5-mile race. The team of Nalu Kukea, Bob Rocheleau, Bruce Blankenfeld, Billy Robello, John Maiolo and Kala Kukea came in at 11 minutes, 30.22 seconds, breaking the old time of 11:44.81.

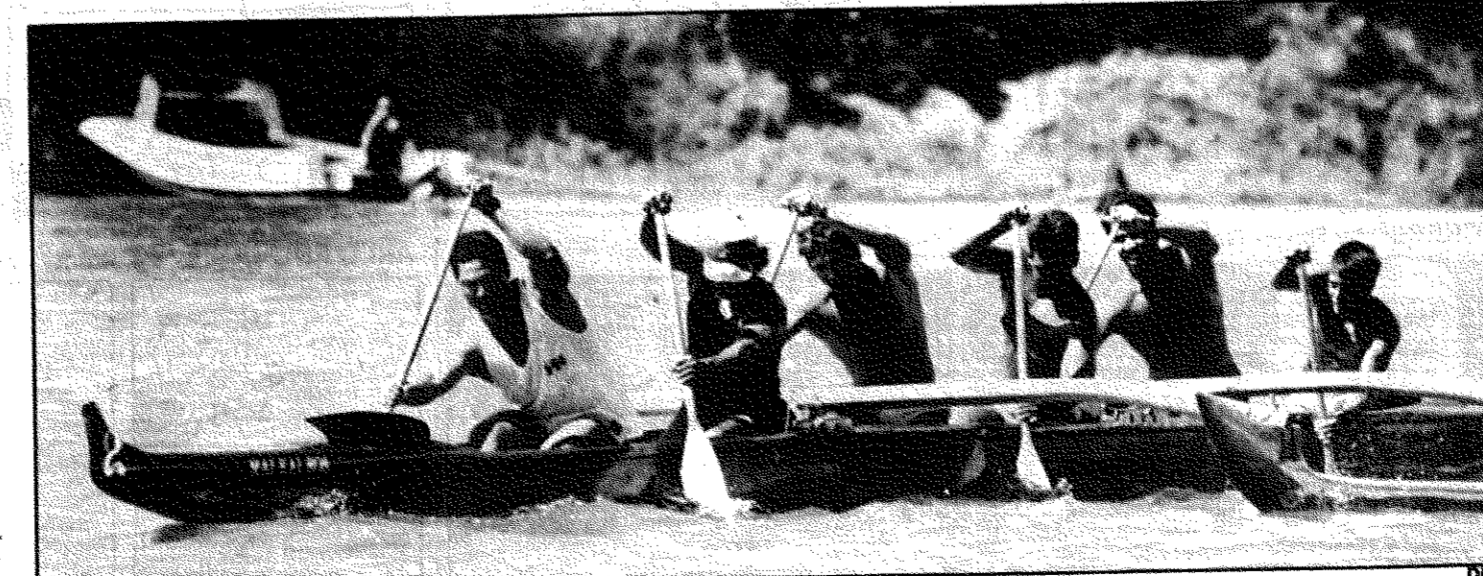
The same crew also won the two-mile Junior men's race with

a time of 15:48.12.

Hui Nalu's women won the half-mile Novice A race, as well as the one-mile Sophomore race. The Novice A team of Becky Fardal, Damaine Hasegawa, Jana Mizuo, Eliasa Merk, Dana Chang and Cindy Kaneshiro finished with a time of 4:48.63 seconds.

The Sophomore team of Sandy Combis, Sue Erickson, Butchie Lee, Merk, Marion Lyman-Mersereau and Denise Darval finished in 8:34.96.

Another record set for the day was by Outrigger's women's 18s, which completed its half-mile race with a time of 4:31.34, breaking the old mark of 4:35.68 set by Kailua in 1986. The Outrigger crew included Hawaii Kai's Missy Mowat.
