In Denmark, George Molholm was a silversmith. Now everything he touches turns to gold.

Molholm is director of the Golden Goddess Jackpot, Kona Gold Jackpot, and International \$1,000,000 Golden Marlin fishing tournaments.

Entry into the Golden Marlin tournament, which will be held Sept. 8-12 at Kona, costs \$21,600 per team or \$5,400 per individual. First prize is worth \$400,000.

Thirty-five teams were entered at one point, but that number has since dropped to 18.

"People change their minds, even if they have their deposit in," Molholm said. "It was looking really good with 35 teams, but we're not going to have that many this year."

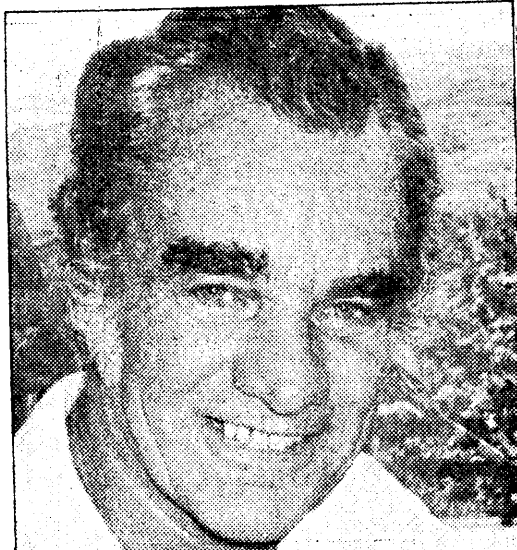
Still, Molholm remains optimistic that the event will catch on in a year or two. "I'm sure it will work," he said.

This year's tournament has attracted anglers from Australia, Tahiti, Canada, the Mainland and Hawaii.

Among them will be California's Mike Kehoe, who was the top angler last year. He will be with the same team and boat — skipper Michael Ly Car's "Right Price."

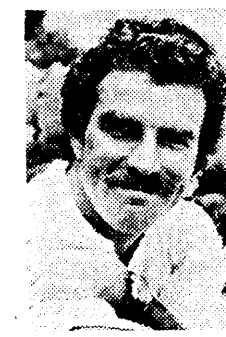

DANVILLE, Va.—**Ruben Chappins** of Honolulu scored a major triathlon victory Saturday, finishing first in the Virginia Triathlon with a record time of 2 hours, 26 minutes, 13 seconds for the three-event endurance test.

The victory, in humid, 95-degree weather, qualified Chappins for the Oct. 20 Ironman Triathlon in Kona. His winning time for the two-kilometer swim, 40-K bicycle race and 15-K run, broke **Curtis Alitz's** course record of 2:29:15. **Chappins**, who has com-eted in six

Mainland triathlons in as many weeks, earned \$800 for his Virginia victory plus a \$200 bonus for bettering the record.

Moloka'i Hoe Oct. 13

The 34th annual Moloka'i Hoe, the 40.8-mile crossing of the Kaiwi (Moloka'i) Channel by canoe, begins at 7:30 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 13 beginning at Hale-O-Lono Harbor on Moloka'i.

The finish line is at Fort DeRussy Beach at Waikiki on Oahu. World-class teams from all over the Pacific and Germany are expected to compete. The **Outrigger Canoe Club**, the defending champions, winners of six of the last 10 crossings and 10 Moloka'i Hoe altogether, are the defending champions.
