"People change their minds, even if they have their deposit in," Molholm said. "It was looking really good with 35 teams, but we're not going to have that many this year."



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
> many years and while he was UH quarterback in 1920, he arranged for the first intercollegiate football game to be played here between the Rainbows and U. of Nevada, RHS
