Canoe competition strong again

Three Maui crews find gold in Hanalei Bay's pristine waters

HANALEI BAY, Kauai - The high point came early for Maui at the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Championships. The low point came about 21 events later.

Maui earned two of its three gold medals before the morning sky had a chance to clear away the rain clouds over Hanalei Bay Saturday. And Maui's big sweep came only five events deep in the 31-event re-

Fourteen crews paddled onto smooth waters for the boys 12 event, the second event of the day. A couple minutes later, Maui had its first gold medal.

during the Maui County season, Kosuga and Christopher Balcita earned the gold medal with a shot off the line and a little over 2:13.33 clocking for the 1/4-mile two minutes later they had exacted race. Gabe Olsen, Cypriano their revenge in the shape of a gold Simarago, Patrick Kekahuna, Donald Mahoe, Kawika Kea and Leeward Akahi had little trouble with the "big boys" from Honolulu as Akahi steered Na Kai Ewalu to the finish line three seconds ahead of the second-place canoe, Oahu's Hui Lanakila (2:11.20).

Akahi had little trouble handling Hanalei's smooth waters or steering the koa canoe required for competition on the state level. According to Akabi, the big difference between the water at Hanalei and Kahului Harbor was visibilty.

"Hanalei is more clean," said Akahi, a student at Iao School.

Although Na Kai Ewalu's boys are used to paddling in one of six lanes at Maui races, they found lane seven to their liking at Hanalei.

"Lucky seven, that's for us," said Kekahuna, who also said he kept his eyes on the competition most of the race.

"I had to watch so we could win," said Kekahuna, who sat seat Luuwai. "All year they've been three for the winning crew and also chasing Napili and Kahana, that

attends Iao School. "I had to know when to start stroking hard, to pick

Almost before Na Kai Ewalu had a chance to pick up its gold medals, Maui was already busy experiencing its biggest thrill of the day.

The boys 13 event featured 14 crews, a full house, with Napili in lane 2. Kahana in lane 4 and Hawaiian in lane 12.

Lanes 1, 2 and 3, the inside lanes, were supposed to be the fast lanes, but Hawaiian's boys weren't worried. They had been struggling against Napili and Kahana all year and still hadn't won a race - the point wasn't to get a good lane, it was to beat their two rivals.

Sherman Haupu, George Keani, Na Kai Ewalu's boys, undefeated Mark Rocco, Donald Pyle, Keoka

Hawaiian finished first in 2:03.46. Napili was second in 2:03.88, and Kahana placed third at 2:07.98.

"It was easy steering," said Balcita, the crew's captain, "No current at all.

What did the crew do to jump from third place on Maui to first place in the state? It was simple,

said Balcita: "Paddle harder." "When you have faith in a crew, you have to stand by them." said Paul Luuwai, who coached Hawaiian's 13s. "We had to buy a lane for them because they didn't qualify for one during the regatta season. But we knew they could do it. So we paid \$25 for the lane Molokai

To help his crew, Luuwai shifted two paddlers from his boys 12 crew in the 13 race - Kosuga and Balcita. The change paid off in a big way, a gold way.

"I knew they could do it." said

helps. When you have tough competition on Maui, you get ready for the state."

Kihei's novice A women had little trouble winning on Maui. At the last regatta of the season, Greta Owen, Cindy Heberton, Deborah Belezos, Aimee Anderson, Sarah Kai Ewalu by 14 seconds in a 1/2mile race. Kai Opua gave them a little more trouble Saturday, but not

Kihei won the gold with a 1/2-mile time of 4:31.23. Kai Opua finished second in 4:34.95.

"The course was wonderful," said Carroll, who steered Kihei in lane two. "The water felt really

Carroll didn't run into any real problems until she made the turn at the 1/4-mile mark. "We powered into the turn and I felt really good because I knew we

were in the lead, then I looked up and I couldn't see our flag." Carroll had to steer by feel until she was halfway up the course, then she picked the white flag out of the

light background and made a

crew a gold medal.

"The funny thing about Carroll, she has never won anything but gold medals," said head Coach Mike Gerry. "In every race she's been in she's been first.'

Carroll, in her second year of paddling, won six events last year Thompson and Pam Carroll beat Na and six this year. Her crew was disqualified once.

Novice A races are for paddlers in their first or second year of racing. Carroll was the oldest member of the winning crew (42). At the other end of the boat, Owen, the stroker, was the youngest (23).

Once Kihei collected its gold medals, Maui County hit a dry spell that last 17 events, until the end of the regatta.

During much of that time. though, Maui's eyes were on Hawaiian Canoe Club.

Hawaiian, the Maui County champions, held onto second place in the team standings of the AAA division (clubs with more than 14 crews entered) until event 26.

Before the women sophomores hit the water, Outrigger held a commanding lead with 135 points. But Hawaiian was hanging in with 66 points for second place. Haui Nalu had 60 for third. Hanalei was in fourth with 58. Kailua was in fifth with 55.

"There's really no telling what is going to happen in a regatta until the sophomore, junior and senior races," said coach Tom McTigue, head coach of Outrigger Canoe Club. "On Oahu those races are very competitive."

So competitive that Hawaiian failed to score in the final six events of the day and ended up in fifth place, behind Outrigger (182), Hui Nalu (93), Hanalei (89) and

Kailua (75). "It just goes to show that we have to take another step before we're ready to compete with Oahu," said Hawaiian's head coach, Rob Hoonan. "Our junior division can compete but our adults have a way too go before they can compete at the same level with

Oahu." Hawaiian finished second in the race for the junior division (18under) title, scoring 45 points to Outriggers 56. Hui Nalu finished third with 31.

Outrigger wins sixth straight state canoe championship

HANALEI, Kauai - Backed by its women's senior masters crew winning its sixth consecutive state gold medal, Outrigger Canoe Club easily won its sixth straight Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association state title Saturday at Hanalei Bay.

Outrigger, competing in all 31 events, amassed 182 points in the AAA division (15-or-more crews) followed by Hui Nalu of Oahu's 93 points and host Hanalei with 89.

In the AA division (7-14 crews), Oahu's Healani added to its 100th anniversary celebration with six first places and 84 points for top

Big Island clubs picked up the other two trophies - Kailua-Kona's Kai O Pua second with 72 points and Kamehameha of Hilo

third with 39 points. The A division trophy (six-or-less

crews) went to Waikiki Surf Club with 32 points.

Big Island clubs again finished 2-3 with Kai E Hitu second with 25 points and Keaukaha third with 16. Outrigger, which lost its last

state regatta on Hanalei Bay in 1984, won 13 events. Four of its winning freshmen women's crew — Dione Wilbur, Kaili Chun, Terri Pynchon and Sarah Reilly moved up to race juniors ... and won that event as well.
