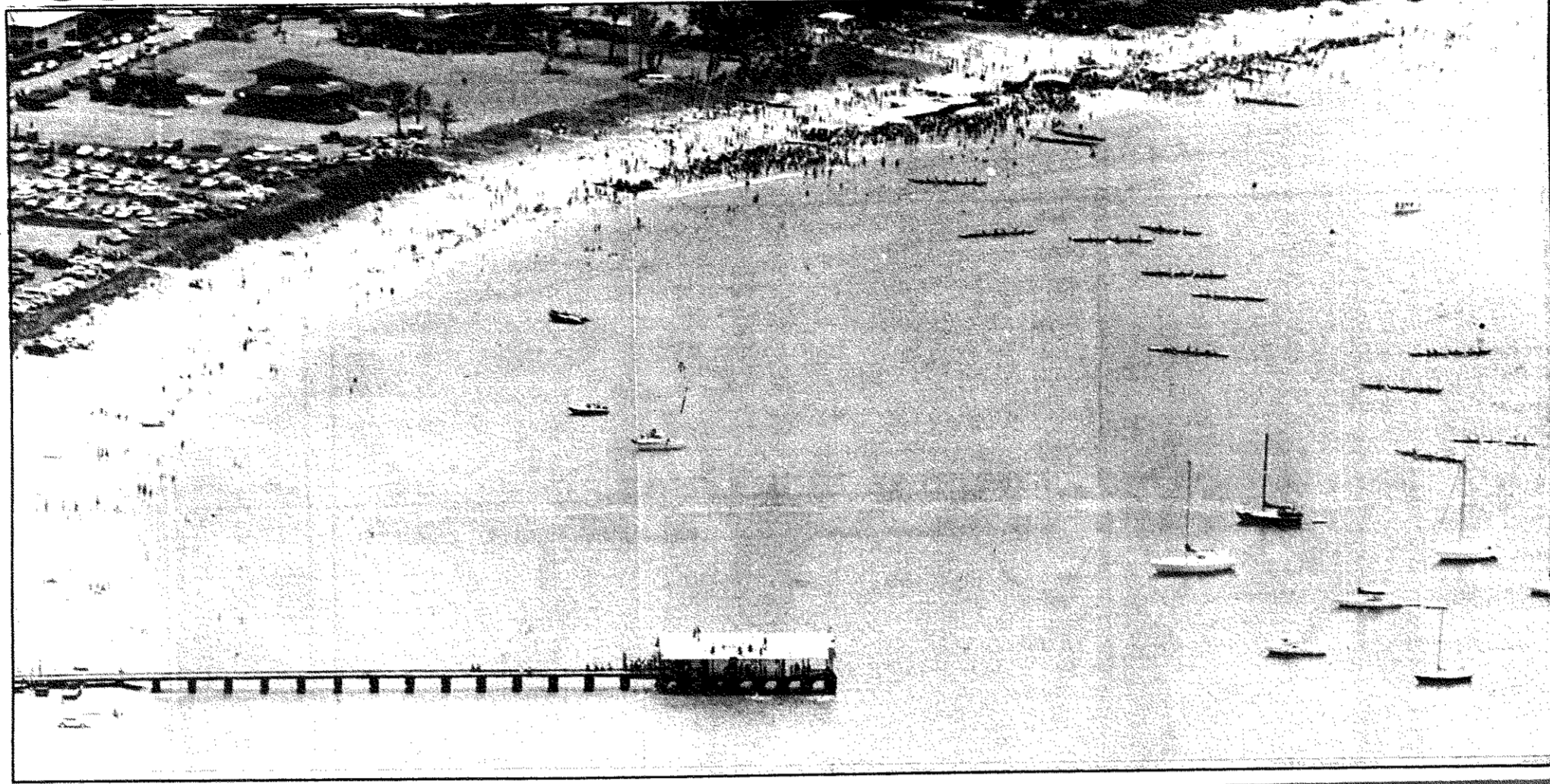


Outrigger retains state title at Hanalei

CANOE CLUBS from around the state were at Hanalei last Saturday to compete in the Steinlager Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association's 40th annual state championship regatta. O'ahu's Outrigger Canoe Club successfully defended its title for the sixth year in a row, winning the Triple A division, (for clubs with 15 or more crews), by entering 31 teams in 31 events throughout the day. The daylong event was marked with all of the camaraderie and excitement typical of canoe races throughout the state.

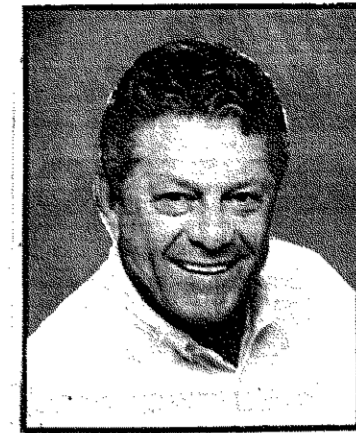
A very special birthday celebration is happening in August — the 100th birthday of Hawaii's own Duke Kahanamoku.

Outrigger wins state crown

Oahu's Outrigger Canoe Club successfully defended its title for the sixth consecutive year at the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association's 40th annual state championship regatta Saturday at Hanalei Bay on Kauai.

Outrigger won the Triple A division, (for clubs with 15 or more crews), by entering 31 teams in 31 events throughout the day. By fielding such depth of competition, they accumulated 182 points by day's end, finishing 89 points in front of second-place Hui Nalu Canoe Club, also of Oahu, with 93 points. In third place was Kauai's Hanalei Canoe Club with 89 points.

Healani Canoe Club of Oahu took an early lead in the Double-A division (7-14 crews), and didn't relinquish it all day, finishing with a total of 84 points.

Kona's Kai O Pua Canoe Club was second with 72 points and in third place was Kamehameha of Hilo with 39 points.

In the A division (six or less crews), Waikiki Surf Club also took an early lead and held onto it, finishing with 32 points. In second place was the Big Island's Kai E Hitu with 25 points and Keaukaha was third with 16 points.

The outstanding crew of the day was Outrigger's senior master's women (45 and over), who paddled to their sixth consecutive state title. The same six women have paddled together since 1984. Their ages range from 47 to 63, with an accumulated total of 327 years of canoe-racing experience between them.

The championships conclude the canoe regatta season and lead into the long-distance canoe racing season beginning this month.
