Tax help is still available for senior citizens, others

QUESTION: Kokua Line usually prints a schedule of places where senior citizens can get help in preparing their income tax returns without charge. Is this service still being offered? I have been watching the papers but haven't seen anything on this yet.

Answer: The information was published in Kokua Line two months ago, several days before the statewide program got under way to assist senior citizens, people with lower incomes who do not speak English and the physically handicapped.

Hundreds of volunteers have been trained and certified by the Internal Revenue Service to assist taxpayers until April 15 when federal returns are usually due. But because April 15 is a Sunday, the deadline will be Monday. April 16. State returns must be filed by April 20.

Be sure to take along your 1988 return, the 1989 packets mailed you by the IRS and state tax office. and pertinent documents. To find out the site nearest you, call 523-4545 or 541-1040. Neighbor is landers may call the toll-free number: 1-800-424-1040.

Assistance will be given those with simple returns, such as Forms 1040EZ, 1040A and 1040. Taxpayers with businesses, farms or rental income will not be helped.

Q: When I was let go from my job last year. I received severance pay. Must I include that money as income on my tax return?

A: Yes. Severance pay is taxable income. A lump-sum payment for cancellation of an employment contract is income in the year received and must be reported with other wages and salaries.

Q: Are there special tax rules for active duty military personnel?

A: Yes. There are several areas of federal income taxation that apply specially to members of the Armed Services such as automatic extensions of time to file tax returns for overseas personnel and special rules when you sell your home.

CAUCASIAN CLUB?

It surprises me that Ron Sorrell, a wonderful surfer and former president of the Outrigger Canoe Club, is totally unaware of the incident that occurred in the late '40s at the Outrigger [Letters, February].

Bill Smith Jr., winner of two gold swimming medals in the 1948 London Olympic Games, had been awarded a lifetime membership by the club for his achievement.

One day, Bill brought Keo Nakama, his old swimming teammate from Maui and Ohio State, to the Outrigger Club for lunch. Keo was a highly respected, many times local and national swimming champion. He also lettered

in baseball at Ohio State, was team captain and also one of the most popular athletes ever

on the Buckeye campus. Nonetheless, as Bill related the story to me, he was approached immediately by then-OCC manager Gay Harris (also a former Olympian) and told in no uncertain terms that Smith's guest was not allowed on the premises, and would have to leave. The racial connotation behind the request was manifest.

Bill and Keo left forthwith. And Bill Smith never returned, resigning his membership immediately following the incident. You see, Ron, like yourself, Bill had no idea

such an unspoken, unwritten rule existed. But on that day it most certainly did.

It was known into the '60s that the Outrigger, along with O'ahu Country Club, the Pacific Club, the Elks and the Junior League, had unspoken Oriental exclusion rules. And until John Fox fixed it, Punahou was limited to a low percentile of Oriental enrollment.

The Hawai'i Yacht Club and Wai'alae and Mid-Pacific country clubs led the way into the 20th century with open membership rolls. CARLOS E. RIVAS
