

## Work-out weekend for paddlers

Queen Liliuokalani Long Distance canoe races, a two day event, drew more than a hundred canoes to Kona over the Labor Day weekend.

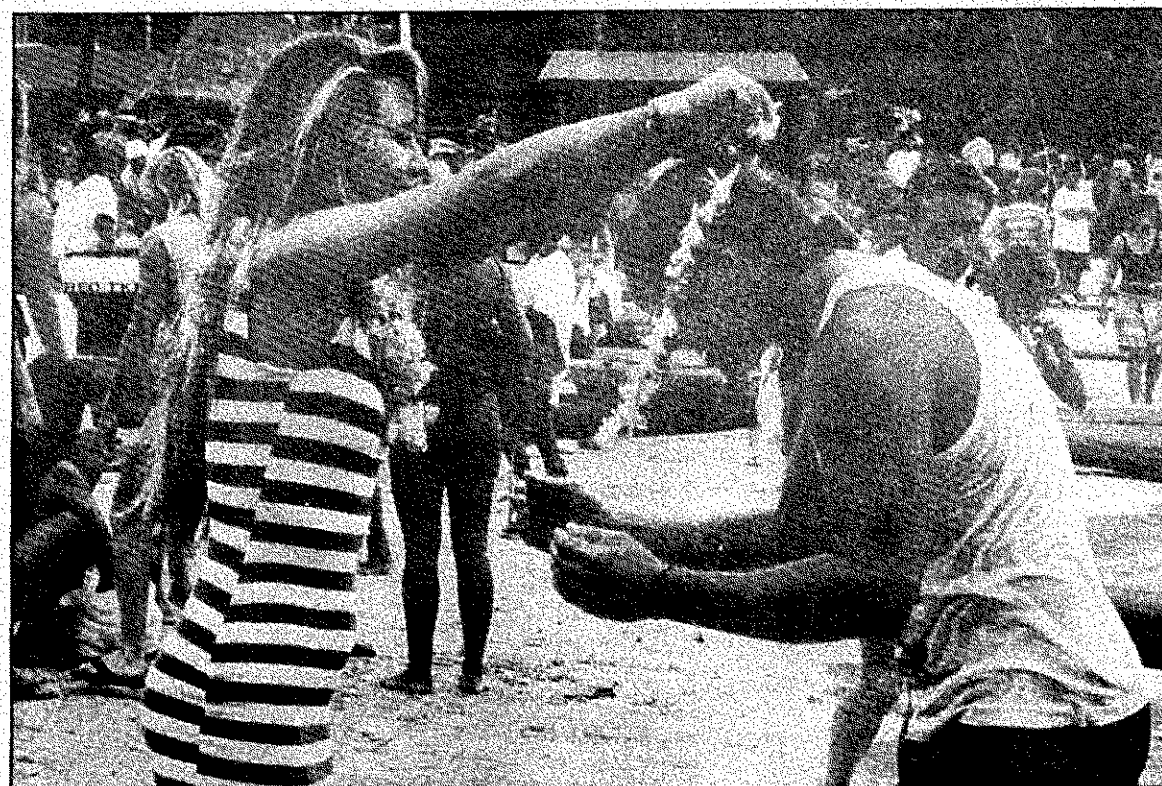
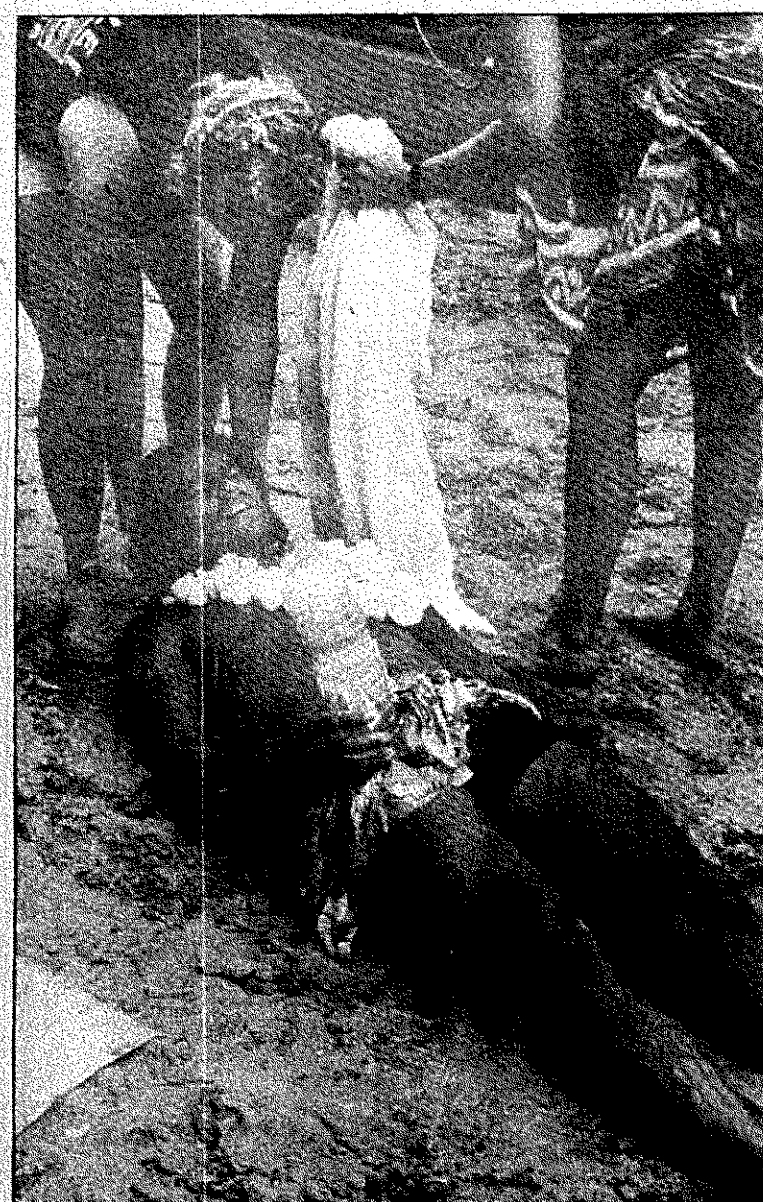
What may be the most popular long-distance canoe event — next to the Molokai-Oahu race — took paddlers from Kailua to Honaunau and back on Saturday and on Sunday from Kailua to Keauhou and back. The races are sponsored by Kai Opua Canoe Club.

The team completed the course in just under two hours, 1:58:34. Second place went to the Kamehameha club from Hilo with a time of 2:00:18. At top, the starting gun fires and 66 teams and more than 100 canoes are paddled over the starting line near City of Refuge enroute to Kailua Bay. Each canoe carried six paddlers and an official. At right, members of the Ka Mo'i canoe club from Waianae use duct tape to seal the joint where the canoe's outrigger is attached. Precise measurements are made to ensure that the outrigger is positioned properly, then it is secured by rope.

## Californian cycles fastest to the sun

Californian Tom Resh beat Hawaii's best in pedaling his way to the top of Haleakala in winning the Wake Cycle to the Sun in record time.

Resh completed the 38-mile course from Paia (sea level) to the summit of Haleakala (10,000 feet) in 2 hours, 45 minutes, 32 seconds, breaking the record of 2:52:06 set by Honolulu's Ruben Chappins last year.

"I felt pretty good," Resh said. "I had to push hard through the middle part and the last half mile. It's a nice race."

Matt Allen of the Big Island finished second (2:53:34), followed by Colorado's Erik Schmidt and Honolulu's Kelly Beck and Chappins. Beck won Saturday's race, a 60-mile from Kaaunapali to Wailea and back.

Honolulu's Cheryl Brady won the women's division in a record 3:22:21.

Forrest Treadwell of Maui won the junior division in 3:06:05.

East Division game with the Farrington Governors Friday night. Kahuku limped away from the contest with a 9-7 loss.

With the win, the Governors made the biggest jump in the top 10 moving from ninth to a tie for fourth. Farrington earned 67 points, just two

points out of third place. For coach Skippa Diaz, he could do without any kind of ranking.

"It is way too early for this kind of talk," Diaz said. "This team could still finish 2-6 (in the OIA East). I don't know how we moved that much, but then I don't have any control over rankings."

St. Louis, which escaped with a 16-9 win over Iolani Friday for its 43rd straight victory, was the unanimous choice for the top spot and Waianae remained in second after whipping Campbell 48-0.

Kahuku took the biggest fall — from third to eighth.

Leilehua moved from fifth to third with a 48-0 drubbing of Pearl City. Iolani's showing against St. Louis kept it in fourth place, in a tie with Farrington.

Damien, seventh last week, fell out of the top 10 with a 14-7 loss to Kamehameha, which held onto sixth place.

**Atisanoe loses opener:** Defending champion Chiyonofuji and fellow yokozunas (grand champions) Hokutoumi and Onokuni all won, but ozeki (champions) Konishiki and Asahifuji lost Sunday, the opening day of the 15-day Autumn

Grand Sumo Tournament in Tokyo.

Chiyonofuji easily beat komusubi (junior champion second class) Tochinosakawa.

It was the 34-year-old Chiyonofuji's 953rd career victory. During this tournament, Chiyonofuji could break the record of 964 career victories set by former komusubi Oshio.

Konishiki, who is Hawaii-born Salevaa Atisanoe, lost to No. 4 maegashira Hananokuni.

**Hui Nalu triumphs:** The Hui Nalu women's crew won its third straight long-distance canoe race of the season yesterday, winning the E Lahoe Na Wahine Long Distance Race, a 31-mile paddle from Kaimama Beach to Pokai Bay.

Hui Nalu's crew of Ann Malama, Becky Hara, Sue Erickson, Lorey Bode, Katie Johnson, Denise Darval, Sandy Combis, Jenny Scafe, Michelle Kapana-Baird, Diane Almadova, Lindsey Styan and B.J. Moffet finished with a time of 4 hours, 32 minutes, 50 seconds in a koa canoe.

Healani, in a fiberglass canoe, finished second in 4:34:23, followed by Outrigger (4:43:58), SurfSports (4:50:44) and Waikiki Yacht Club (4:32:50).

## Oahu clubs dominate long-distance affair

Healani and Outrigger Canoe Clubs came away with top finishes during the Queen Liliuokalani Long Distance Canoe Race held over the Labor Day weekend in Kailua-Kona.

Healani won the overall championship in both the women's single- and double-hulled competition. Outrigger

swept both koa and non-koa titles in the single-hull men's events. Kamehameha of Hilo was the top finisher for Big Island clubs, capturing the men's double hull championship.

Kamehameha was also the top Big Island finisher in the single-hull competition, finishing second overall in the men's competition and seventh for the women.

The race attracted paddlers from as far away as Tahiti and California, as well as all the major Hawaiian Islands.
