Lanikai to host state meet

Top volleyball powers to compete

LANIKAI
Thirty-six of Hawaii's best volleyball teams from Oahu, Maui and the Big Island will meet in a day-long showdown during the Third Annual Lanikai Statewide Grass Court Volleyball Championship from 8:30 a.m. - 6 p.m. Saturday at the Lanikai Community Association Park on Aalapa Drive.

The tournament is presented by the Lanikai Athletic Club, **Outrigger Canoe Club**, a perennial volleyball power, will field six teams, including those competing in the men's and women's open and amateur divisions, as well as a men's masters team made up of players 35 years old and above.

Pool play will be held from 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., while the finals are scheduled from 4:30 - 6 p.m.

There is no admission fee to watch the tournament, but the organizers emphasized that cars parked on the bikeways

in Lanikai will be towed away. Teams will play 18-point games and a 25-minute "running clock" time limit will be in effect for each of the games.

Historic Outrigger Canoe Race Set

The most ambitious canoe race in Hawaii history—a Kauai channel outrigger competition—is being planned for March of 1987. The race will be the world's longest, most treacherous and demanding outrigger event. Entrants not only must negotiate the nearly 100 miles of open ocean and Kauai channel water, but they must do so at night.

The race will begin at sunset from North Shore's Haliewa-Alii Park. The competitors will paddle through the night before arriving at Kauai's Nawiliwili Harbor some 12 to 14 hours later.

The event will coincide with the celebration of the 105th birthday of Prince Jonah Kamehameha Kuhio, Hawaii's "King of Sports."

THE OFFICIAL NAME of the contest, which is expected to become an annual event, is the Prince Kuhio International-World Championship Kauai Channel Outrigger Canoe Race.

The competition will feature 10 of the best outrigger canoe clubs/teams from Hawaii, Tahiti,

Southern California and possibly one other South Pacific entrant.

To qualify, each of the 10 teams must have placed first in at least one long-distance race—25 miles or more on the open ocean—during the 1986 canoe paddling season.

The process of selecting the 10 best entrants for invitation will be done by the clubs and associations. They will name their island, state or country champions

as their representative teams. The conclusion of the race will launch a day of celebration and festivities on Kauai, birthplace of Prince Kuhio.

The awards presentation will highlight the day. The first place team will be honored and will receive the Prince Jonah Kuhio Perpetual Trophy as well as a grand cash prize award.

There will be no losers. Each participating team will be ac-

knowledgeable and will receive cash prizes.

In addition, every paddler will be recognized for courage and sportsmanship, heightening awareness of the sport of outrigger canoe racing which plays such a significant role in Hawaiian culture.

The historic event will be the first organized competition of its kind ever attempted. It is expected to receive international acclaim.
