KAILUA — Lanikai Canoe Club's Senior Men's crew not only won Sunday's 28th annual Duke Kahanamoku Classic Long Distance Canoe Race at Kailua Beach Park. it shattered the old course record by a staggering 10 minutes.

The nine-man crew of Bo Eastabrooks. Jim Foti, John Foti, Kalani Irvine, Rich Lambert, Bob Nottage, Rocky Owens, Mike Pederson and Mike Smith held off a pesky Outrigger team to capture the 26-mile race from Kailua to Waikiki in 2 hours and 49.21

Crew members credited good sea conditions and a stiff challenge from the Outrigger team as reasons for the impressive time.

"It was a combination of things," said John Foti, the crew's training coach. "The tides were right for sure. Plus, there was a lot of competition between us and Outrigger."

However, Lanikai paddlers and remaining outside will argue that their time was established with a crew traveling from Kailua to Waikiki, rather than in the opposite direction Outrigger travelled 10 years ago.

Lanikai spokesperson Suzanna Gilbert said most paddlers consider the Kailua-to-Waikiki route more difficult than the Waikiki-to-Kailua route because of stronger wave and wind conditions.

She added that the closest another crew has come in running a below-three-hour time when traveling from Kailua to Waikiki was back in 1976, when Outrigger finished the race in 2:59.00.

Except for a small stretch in front of Sandy Beach Park, Lanikai led the race from start to finish. Outrigger, however, kept the pressure on by taking an inside route and hugging the cliffs as it rounded Makapuu Point. Lanikai, with an already established core of

Technically, Lanikai bested the event's old veteran paddlers, took the more conserva-

Lanikai struggled with an open-sea change near Alan Davis Beach, and that allowed Outrigger to surge past the crew for a brief moment. Lanikai was able to regroup, however, and minutes later, passed Outrigger for good near Sandy Beach Park.

"But we never really slammed the door shut on them," Foti said. "Outrigger was always within a couple of minutes of us. It was pretty tight.'

Lanikai's victory should come as no surprise; the team has dominated its division in the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association for the past three years, and has won the state senior men's races over the past

"We keep getting better and better," Foti said. "I would have retired long ago if we had hit a plateau or gotten worse, but we keep improving.

The women's event features a Le Mans start in which the paddlers race from the beach to the water before they enter their canoes. The six-mile journey takes crews from Kailua Beach Park, around Mokolea Rock. and then around Popoia (Flat) Island before the race concludes where it started.

The men's race has a more traditional start, with crews lining up near the shoreline and jockeying each other for position. The men then cover a distance of approximately 26 miles from Kailua to the Duke Kahanamoku Beach in front of the Hilton Hawaiian Village.

Outrigger set the men's record back in 1985 with a time of two hours, 52.30 seconds, while Healani Canoe Club established the women's mark in 1988 with a time of 38 minutes and 47 seconds.



Outrigger women pull away for Dad Center win

Saving the best for last, Outrigger Canoe Club broke yesterday's Dad Center Race for women wide open, winning the 24-mile contest from Kailua to Waikiki in late dramatic fashion.

'A tremendous race between Kailua and ourselves - a contest that could have gone either way, said Kisi Haine, steerswoman of the victorious Outrigger crew.

From the Windward Oahu start, past Makapuu Point, around Koko Head to Niu Valley, Outrigger and Kailua battled stroke for stroke. The boats were never more than vards apart.

"I can't say why we powered away from Kailua at Niu after paddling so close for so long," Haine said. "Perhaps we found the right paddler combination, or we caught a wave or two they didn't. 'Whatever happened," she said,

"Kailua gave us quite a scare." Outrigger turned the windblown course in three hours, 21 minutes and 17 seconds, followed by Kailua in 3:23:58. Kona's Kai O'Pua finished third in 3:32:35.

The Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association contest drew 24 nine-women teams. The race ended at the hosting Outrigger Canoe Club near San Souci Beach.

"Kisi, in my opinion, deserves much of the credit for our win,' said Outrigger paddler Traci Phillips. "She did a superior job steering. She found waves (to surf)

The Lokahi Masters capsized its Force Five off Sandy Beach yesterday, and the crew lost 10 minutes getting the boat upright and underway.

"Our upset wasn't the canoe's fault." said crew member Joy Waikoloa. "Our capsize came as a result of the strong wind, bumpy seas and making crew changes while underway.

Waikiki Surf Club topped the race's koa division, finishing ninth overall in 3:45:24.

Maui's Hawaiian Canoe Club won the masters title (paddlers 35 overall in 3:47:58.
