Colorado 5th down stands

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A play that never should have been run cost Missouri a victory and seven Big Eight officials an indefinite suspension.

The Big Eight yesterday ruled that Colorado's 33-31 victory over Missouri will stand even though game officials allowed the Buffaloes' a fifth down that produced the winning touchdown on the game's final play.

"It has been determined that, in accordance with the football playing rules, the allowance of the fifth down to Colorado is not a postgame correctable error," Big Eight commissioner Carl James said in a statement. "The final score in the Colorado-Missouri football game will remain as posted."

The officials, all veteran members of Big Eight games, were suspended indefinitely beginning with this week's games. Their future in the league was uncertain.

WAC honors Corontzos

DENVER (AP) — Wyoming quarterback Tom Corontzos and New Mexico linebacker Steve Vaipulu have been named the Western Athletic Conference players of the week.

Corontzos was named after he completed 20 passes out of 32 attempts for 421 yards and three touchdowns, leading the Cowboys over San Diego State 52-51.

Vaipulu had two sacks and now leads the conference with 11.

Vaipulu has sacked at least one quarterback in every game this season, and is just six sacks short of the school record.

He also caused two fumbles, had one tackle for a loss and had four other unassisted tackles.

Big East invites Miami

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) — The University of Miami yesterday received an invitation to become the 10th member of the Big East Conference, and the school's board of trustees will decide Wednesday whether to accept the offer.

Big East officials have been courting the independent school for several months, and had reportedly been awaiting a signal that Miami would accept an invitation before extending one.

Pittsburgh's 'B Boys' 7 for 34, 2 rbi Cincy stymies Pirates, 6-3

PITTSBURGH — The Cincinnati Reds broke their hitting slump and Zane Smith's magic yesterday to take a 2-1 lead over the Pittsburgh Pirates in the National League playoffs.

Neither team did much hitting in the first two games, combining for only 10 runs and 23 hits. But the surprise was how easily the Reds got to Smith for a 6-3 victory.

In 10 starts for the Pirates after being acquired from Montreal on Aug. 8, Smith gave up nine earned runs in 75 innings. In Game 3, the Reds got five runs off Smith in five innings.

The power came from unlikely sources, too.

Former Pirate Billy Hatcher hit a two-run homer in the second inning and Mariano Duncan snapped a 2-2 tie with a three-run homer in the fifth and drove in another run in the ninth with his third hit of the game to make it 6-3.

Game 4 is scheduled for 8:18 p.m. today night as first-game starters Jose Rijo of the Reds and Bob Walk of the Pirates go at it again.

The Reds scored only 20 runs in their last nine regular-season games and showed no signs of breaking out of it in the

first two games, either.

Both teams, however, got their wish in Game 3 as the skies were a steely gray and the shadows of Friday's mid-afternoon start were no problem.

Hatcher opened the fifth with a double and moved to third on winning pitcher Danny Jackson's sacrifice. Barry Larkin, in a 6-for-27 slump, reached on an infield single with Hatcher holding at third.

Duncan then hit a hanging curve over the left-field fence. The Reds' second baseman was 0-for-8 in the playoffs and had only four hits in his previous 30 at-bats.

Hatcher gave the Reds a 2-0 lead when he homered to left after Joe Oliver singled with two outs in the second.

The Pirates traded Hatcher to the Reds on April 3 for minor leaguers Mike Roesler and Jeff Richardson.

Jackson was sharp in the first two innings but then appeared to lose a little velocity. The Pirates tied the score with two runs in the fourth inning and it could have been worse.

Jay Bell led off with a double, Andy Van Slyke walked and Bobby Bonilla singled home a run. One out later, Carmelo

Martinez doubled to tie the score and Don Slaught was intentionally walked to load the bases.

But Jackson struck out Jose Lind and got Smith on a bouncer back to the mound to end the inning. The Pirates had the bases loaded and two outs in the fifth inning but Martinez popped out to short.

Jackson, 6-6 during the season, was replaced by Rob Dibble after Lind doubled with one out in the sixth. Dibble struck out pinch-hitter Gary Redus and Jeff King to end the threat.

On three occasions this season, Jackson was on the disabled list but he finished strong. In his final three starts, the left-hander gave up five runs in 21 innings.

Dibble worked 1 2-3 innings before Norm Charlton relieved to start the ninth. Dibble has retired 12 of the 13 batters he's faced in the playoffs, striking out eight.

Randy Myers struck out the side in the ninth for his second save of the playoffs.

The Pirates scored a run in the eighth off Charlton when Duncan's relay throw to first on a potential double play got away, allowing Barry Bonds to score. Bonds broke a 4-for-34 slump when he opened the ninth with a single.

The Reds made it 6-3 in the ninth on singles by Oliver, pinch-hitter Hal Morris and Duncan.

Browns rally, top Broncos 30-29

DENVER — Bernie Kosar drove the Cleveland Browns to 10 points in the final 3:21 as the Cleveland Browns came back from a nine-point deficit to beat Denver 30-29 on Jerry Kuaric's 30-yard field goal as time expired.

After Denver had taken advantage of Cleveland turnovers to score 10 points earlier in the fourth quarter to erase a 20-19 Browns lead, Kosar rallied Cleveland. He hit a 24-yard pass to Vernon Joines on fourth-and-2 from midfield, then threw his third touchdown pass of the

game, a 24-yarder to Brian Brennan with 3:21 to play.

Then, on the final drive which started with 2:04 left, Kosar completed passes of 15 yards to Joines, 20 to Reggie Langhorne and 15 to Brennan on a third-and-8 play to set up the winning field goal.

Kosar completed 24 of 38 passes for 318 yards.

The win broke a three-game losing streak for the Browns (2-3) and achieved a measure of revenge for the team that lost to the Broncos three times in the last four years in the AFC title game. In fact, Cleveland had lost 11 of its last 12 to

Denver.

Denver, which had five turnovers in a loss to Buffalo last week, is also 2-3. Mark Jackson scored on a 16-yard reverse and David Treadwell kicked a 25-yard field goal as Denver took a 29-20 lead.

Until the late rally, it appeared that Denver would win by the margin of a second-quarter safety, achieved when Denver's Simon Fletcher blocked a punt through the Browns' end zone. It was the third score against the Browns on a punt block in two weeks.

Outrigger wins Moloka'i

The Outrigger Canoe Club No. 1 won the Bankoh Moloka'i Hoe yesterday, outdistancing Off Shore of Calif. with a time of five hours, 19 minutes and 38 seconds. Off Shore crossed the finish line with a time of 5:28:52.

Among island clubs, Kamehameha of Hilo placed 20th with a time of five hours, 59 minutes and 38 seconds.

Keoua Canoe Club of Honaunau, however, was among some crews which were caught by large waves and capsized. Keoua was nearly five hours into the race when capsized off Aina Haina on Oahu.

"We had just made a change, picking up our guys, and as soon as we got them on the boat, a freak wave hit us and rolled us over," said coach Henry Hua. There were six or seven passengers on board the 21-foot Boston Whaler. Another patrol boat came to their rescue and took everyone on board.

Keoua's canoe finished the race, although their paddlers had no relief for the remaining hour-and-a-half. Keoua completed the race with a time of six hours, 19 minutes and 55 seconds, good for 35th place.
