Islands look pretty as 'Fatman' & Co. take on ugly crime

THANK YOU, Bill Conrad, Joe Penny, Alan Campbell and all of the other people involved in bringing "Jake and the Fatman" to the islands. The crimebusters show had its Hawaii location premiere Wednesday night on KGMB. Not only did the two-hour opening program work, with the characters fitting nicely in the new setting, but the photography ranks with the best of any film shot here. Hawaii Visitors Bureau chief Stanley Hong and the rest of the HVB brass must be jumping for joy over the way the show's camera crews captured the sweeping beauty of the islands in sharply focused living color. The scenic treat started right off the bat as the opening credits were shown and continued throughout the show...

BUT ASIDE from the good looks, the actors get high marks for their work. Penny was the big gun in this show, avenging the death of his close friend, a Hawaiian cop. Penny handled all the emotions called for — sadness, bitterness, rage — smoothly. And he was given plenty of opportunity to use his muscle against the bad guys. Conrad was solid as a rock. He isn't capable of turning in a mediocre performance. Campbell, the third man, made the best of his time in the spotlight. As promised by the producers, many nice faces were seen. Al Harrington, Karen Keawehawahi, Warren Fabb and Scott Oughterson received good exposure and many local unknowns were seen as well. Jack Lord's "Hawaii Five-O" provided work for many local actors during its 12-year run and "Jake and the Fatman" is doing the same. In fact, I couldn't help making comparisons with "Five-O" during the show. There are similarities and there is nothing wrong with that. As for the Fatman's pidgin English, it could be worse — and it could be better, too. But nice try, brah...

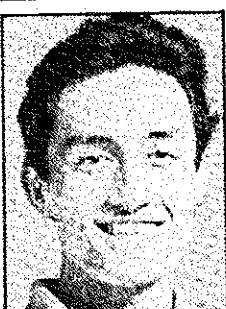

WORKOUT

Digging the spike life

Is there life for collegiate volleyball players after graduation? If they are like Jim Kalaukoa, former University of Hawaii men's team standout, they go right on spiking, digging and blocking. Kalaukoa, 26, a member of Outrigger Canoe Club's men's open team, is preparing for this week's Haili Easter Volleyball Tournament at Hilo and his training regimen rivals that of an Olympian. "Being 'only' 6-foot and a starting middle blocker I have to try harder," Kalaukoa remarked. To keep in blocking shape the Maryknoll High School physical education teacher lifts weights, runs, paddles outrigger canoes and joins his students playing many sports. "The pressure is on me at the Haili. I've been on winning teams the only two times I played there," he said. "Now I'll try for three."

Three years ago, Kalaukoa was a member of the Lokahi Volleyball Club men's open team when it won the Haili championship. Last year he played for Outrigger when it took the men's title. There are several options available for former collegiate players who want to continue in the game, Kalaukoa said. "If you're an exceptional player, turn professional, see the world and make some pretty good money." The next level, he says, is to try out for the U.S. National team with the eventual goal of playing in the Olympics. "Or you can play club volleyball and coach juniors like me. There's not much money in it but it's very satisfying and a lot of fun," he said. Volleyball practice sessions often include two-man games at Waikiki beach. Weight training workouts are rotated among several muscle groups, a different set exercised each day. In addition to playing for OCC in volleyball, Kalaukoa paddles for OCC's novice A crew. His training regimen:
