Konishiki ups record to 3-0

Hawaii-born sumotori Salevaa Atisanoe bulldozed No. 2 mae-gashira (senior wrestler) Sakahoko out of the ring Tuesday for his third straight victory against no defeats in the Summer Grand Sumo Tournament in Tokyo.

The 513-pound Hawaiian charged the 266-pound Sakahoko with hand thrusts, grabbed his foe's belt and drove him out, handing Sakahoko his second defeat against one victory.

Atisanoe, who wrestles as Konishiki, is to meet komusubi (junior champion second class) Ryogoku (0-3) Wednesday.

Konishiki forced No. 3 mae-gashira Kotomazuma out of the ring Monday for his second victory.

In the second-highest senior division, juryo, 10th-ranked American Chad Rowan, or Ak-ebono, charged No. 3-ranked Owakamatsu with hand thrusts and crushed him down for his

second victory against one defeat. Owakamatsu also is 2-1.

In sandanme, the 66th-ranked Henry Armstrong Miller, or Sentoryu, shoved 65th-ranked Wakakudo out of the ring for his second victory against no defeats.

Wrestlers in junior divisions have only seven bouts during the 15-day tournament.

Hawaii teams go 7-1: Hawaii teams won seven of eight games yesterday in the United States Volleyball Association national championships at Raleigh, N.C.

Outrigger's Masters, Golden Masters and Seniors team all went 2-0. The Kaneohe boys team split its two matches. All four teams will be back in action today.

Somerville loses two: Honolulu's Betsy Somerville, competing for the University of Arizona, lost both her singles

and doubles matches yesterday at the NCAA Women's Tennis Championships at Gainesville, Fla.

Somerville lost to Boston College's Jennifer Lane, 0-6, 6-4, 6-3, in her singles match, and teamed with Banni Redhair in losing to Florida's eighth-seeded Holly Danforth and Cathy Goodrich, 6-3, 6-4, in doubles action.

Wheelchair tennis: Martha Fuatagavi of Kailua and John Greer of Kaneohe, who placed third in doubles last year, and Frank Tolua of Honolulu will compete in the International Wheelchair Tennis Tournament May 22-27 in Japan.

Falk named MVP: Martha Falk of the Kupa'a soccer club was named Most Valuable Player of the United States Soccer Federation Over 30 Western Regional Championship.

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6-9 center commits to UH

The University of Hawaii basketball team took another step in solving its shortage in the low post by securing a verbal commitment from a 6-foot-9 center.

Ranquel Smith of Eastern Oklahoma State Junior College plans to attend UH on a basketball scholarship next season, according to his coach, Ron Robison.

Smith averaged 10 points, 7.6 rebounds and 3.2 blocks per game last season.

"He's not a big scorer, but he'll get some rebounds and tip-ins and he runs the floor well," Robison said.

Smith played in only his senior year in high school, where he was a seldom-used center.

On what Robison called a "gamble," Eastern Oklahoma signed Smith. He saw limited playing time as a freshman,

but improved dramatically as a sophomore, Robison said.

UH also reportedly has secured verbal commitments from another 6-9 player and a 6-2 guard.

Outrigger is 17-1: Outrigger Canoe Club teams improved their aggregate record to 17-1 yesterday at the United States Volleyball Association national championships in Raleigh, N.C.

The second-seeded Golden Masters (ages 45 and over) won three matches and the seniors team (30-34) won its two matches. Both are 6-0. The Masters team (35 and over) split two matches and is 5-1.

Kalua second team: University of Hawaii sophomore outfielder Tamara Kalua has been named to the second team all-Big West softball

squad. Kalua was the only UH player to receive mention.

Fresno State's Martha Noffsinger and Margie Wright were named Big West Field Player and Coach of the Year, respectively, and Cal State-Fullerton's Ann Van Dortrecht was named Pitcher of the Year.

Trio make Festival team: With strong showings last weekend in their trials in Seattle, canoe paddler Wyatt Jones and kayakers Chris Ball and Malia Kamisugi earned the right to compete in the U.S. Sports Festival this July.

Horner shoots to a one-stroke lead at Jennie K.

High school senior Nicole Horner shot a 4-over-par 77 yesterday to take the lead after two rounds of the 40th annual Jennie K. Wilson Invitational at Mid-Pacific Country Club.

Horner, 18, has a 36-hole total of 9-over 155 going into this morning's final round. She leads Judi Enright (76) and Lynne Winn (80) by one shot.

Winn has won this tournament twice, in 1982 and '87. Sherrie Sue-Golden, another two-time champion (1986 and '89), is another shot back at 80-157.

First-round leader Camie Hoshino, another high school senior, shot an 85 yesterday and trails Horner by five shots.

Nua signs with Lions: Mark Nua, a former University of Hawaii offensive lineman,

has signed a free agent contract with the Detroit Lions, according to his agent, John Wilbur.

Nua was a Western Athletic Conference second-team all-star in 1988 as a senior.

Nua, who graduated from UH last May, has been battling a weight problem since last year.

"He got up to about 400 pounds at one point," Wilbur said. "I recommended he become a sumo wrestler, but he didn't want to do that. Now he is down to 335 and the Lions signed him."

Nua was listed at 6 feet 7 and 362 pounds in the 1988 UH media guide.

Wilbur said UH coaches George Lumpkin and Bill Souza contacted Detroit offensive coordinator June Jones (a

former UH quarterback and coach) about Nua.

"They knew Mark made a real commitment to get ready to play football," Wilbur said. "That's why Detroit was interested."

Nua left yesterday for Detroit and will be in training until camp opens July 17, Wilbur said.

OCC takes 2 seconds: Outrigger Canoe Club teams from Hawaii finished second in two divisions and third in another yesterday at the U.S. Volleyball Association National Tournament came to a close in Raleigh, N.C.

Outrigger finished second in the Seniors (30-over) and Masters (35-over) divisions, while taking third in the Golden Masters (45-over). Kaneohe-Windward was third
